PROGRAM

Pat Grewe introduced the speaker for today's program. Alan Potash, Regional Director of the Anti-Defamation League, spoke to "Exploring the Complexities of the Middle East."

The Mission of the League is to fight Anti-Semitism, bigotry and extremism. He stated that it would like to erase hate and discrimination worldwide.

Interesting statistics about Rotary and the Middle East are the number of Rotary

Clubs found there which include: Turkey with 226 clubs, Egypt with 73 clubs, and Jordan with 9 clubs. There are no Rotary Clubs in Iran, Yemen, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and Iraq.

Mr. Potash has been following the crisis support for victims of the Haiti earthquake. He stated that as of today Jordan, Lebanon and Turkey have promised relief support. These are all countries that have Rotary clubs and connections. It is expected that many countries in the Middle East will not provide any support at all.

Prior to World War I there was European

influence in the Middle East. But between World War I and 1960 borders were created for countries to exist in the Middle East through independence. Some of the countries and their neighbors do not get along. Israel has had many conflicts with

> neighbors since the country was created. In 2006 there was a conflict with Lebanon. There was a conflict with Hamas and Hezbollah in 2009.


> Israel survives these challenges due to the unique character of its citizens. In 2009, Israel had 63 companies listed on the NASDAQ.

> Between 1980 and 2000, Israel registered 7,652 patents

in the United States. Other examples of registering patents in the same time frame include Egypt with 77 patents and Saudi Arabia with 171 patents.

Israel is considered the world's technonation. Although the country is only 61 years old it survives because of change, spirit and growth. Its biggest challenge is the neighboring countries.

Mr. Potash stated that the key to combating terrorism is education and environment. The three reasons that people are attracted to terrorism: indoctrinated toward those ends, they may be a disenfranchised person or they are a despondent person.

ROTARY MINUTE

The Rotary Foundation has established the <u>Haiti Earthquake Relief Fund</u> for U.S. Rotarians who want to donate toward recovery efforts after a powerful earthquake rocked Haiti on 12 January. Haiti government officials are estimating that as many as 200,000 people are dead and millions more injured after the quake, the impoverished nation's strongest in 200 years, crumbled government buildings, hospitals, schools, and shantytowns. Most of the capital, Port-au-Prince, is in ruins.



A ShelterBox response team of two U.S. Rotarians and one from the United Kingdom has already mobilized and delivered 1,700 containers of supplies to the affected areas. Another 1,600 will be dispatched from the U.K. to Port-au-Prince. Also, more than 100 Aquaboxes are being delivered to Haiti to provide safe water.

Claude Surena, a member of the Rotary Club of Petion-Ville and president of the Haitian Medical Association, is sheltering more than 100 people in his damaged home in Port-au-Prince. He is also leading the efforts of the 17 Haitian Rotary clubs to ensure that the ShelterBox containers will be deployed effectively to the thousands left homeless. The Rotary Club of Curaçao, Netherlands Antilles, has committed US\$50,000 to clubs in the affected areas.

"Rotarians are working hard and fast to get help to those in Haiti," says Past RI Director Barry Rassin, of Nassau, Bahamas, who has previously coordinated relief efforts in the country. "We're at the same time working on long-term efforts."

More than \$75,000 has been donated to District 7020 in the Caribbean, according to Past District Governor Dick McCombe. The district will be coordinating much of the Rotarian relief effort through its Haiti Task Force, set up two years ago to administer all financial aid to the nation.

A six-member team of Rotarians from District 5890 (Texas, USA) has reported in safe after landing in Haiti for a humanitarian mission 45 minutes before the quake struck. They were scheduled to be there a week but returned to Houston, Texas, on 15 January.

Dawn Johnson, president of the Rotary Club of Verrettes, L'Artibonite, Haiti, says the infrastructure couldn't handle a quake this massive.

"The government is highly centralized in Port-au-Prince, which is now entombed in rubble," says Johnson, who was in the U.S. while the quake struck. "The scale of this disaster is so huge. It is way beyond anything Haiti has ever dealt with before."

Johnson plans to return to Haiti at the end of the month. Her club is already working on getting clean water to victims. "I cringe a little at what I might see when I get back."

RI President John Kenny and Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Glenn E. Estess Sr. have sent a joint letter conveying Rotary's condolences to victims of the quake and asking for more information on how Rotarians can help.
