Past District Governor and District Foundation Chair, Sharon Wherry

presented the final program regarding educational programs of the Foundation. Sharon said that she feels The Rotary Foundation was Rotary's best idea when it was formed in 1917 because it has become the heart and soul of Rotary. The power of the Foundation is that it combines the financial strength of 1.2 million Ro-

tarians which can make a huge difference in the world. Sharon showed

the club a number of individual examples of how Foundation programs have changed lives of those who participate such as Angeline Petak who was an Ambassadorial Scholar to Zambia in 07-08 and MJ Voinovich who was a world peace scholar in 05-07. 60% of world peace scholars go on to work in peace related areas. Many also join Rotary when they return home.

The matching grants program is very powerful. For example a recent match-

ing grant obtained by Lincoln East for a Zambia water well project started with \$5,000 contributed by the club which was matched by the District to become \$10,000. This was further matched 75 to 1 by Rotary International to result in a final total of \$17,500 for the project. District Simplified

Grants have been used extensively by clubs in the district as 12 of the 46 clubs applied for and received \$2,000 grants.

The Foundation is unique in that all contributions are invested for 3 years before principal is available to be spent on projects. As a result interest earnings on the invested funds are used to pay administrative costs so that 100% of all contributions are spent on projects. The Rotary Foundation reaches 260 countries as compared to the UN which only reaches 195. One reason that the Foundation is so effective is that it can go where governments cannot. The Foundation has been ranked as the #4 charity in the world ahead of Ki-

wanis, Optimist and Lions clubs. By far the biggest accomplishment of the Foundation has been to play a major role in the

eradication ofwhich has been 99% eliminated. There are 2 ways to give, The Annual Program Fund Permanent and the Fund. The goal of the Annual Program Fund is to get every Rotarian to give \$100 every year. 13 of the 46 District Clubs

have achieved that goal with Lincoln South coming in at #2

in the District with >\$180 per member.

The District is currently working on a future Vision Plan which includes a 3 year test grant structure. The new structure will have 2 types of grants: Smaller District Simplified Grants and Global Grants which are \$15,000 or larger.

One of the Foundation's educational programs that changes lives is the Group Study Exchange (GSE). Sharon introduced Mylani Veney who was a for-

> mer team leader for Group Study Exchange and is the current inbound chair for GSE. Mylani told the club that the experience changed her life in very positive ways and it was very interaction of her team and the goodwill be-

rewarding to watch the with the local culture tween the countries that the GSE program fosters. This year we will

have 2 teams visiting the district. One team from Pakistan is just a one way exchange since they are not able to host a team due to the political situation in their country. The 2nd team is from Brazil and the District will be sponsoring an outbound team to Brazil as well. Due to financial constraints the outbound teams will go every 2 years with the next team scheduled to go to Turkey in 2011. She encouraged members to consider hosting inbound team members in their homes as that was the most meaningful part of her

experience with she was a team member.

Dr. George J. Lytton Memorial Challenge Lincoln South Rotary Club 2009-2010 Rotary International Foundation Drive

Joe Roberts, chair of the Lincoln South portion of annual Rotary International Foundation Drive kicked off the drive on Friday. In recent years the Foundation drive has been named for Dr. George J. Lytton, longtime member of Lincoln South who was very passionate about the cause and was instrumental in the success of the Lincoln South Drive by setting up the annual drawing to allow members to become immediate Paul Harris Fellows. Dr. Lytton is deceased but his legacy has been continued by the members in Lincoln South as we continue to rank in the top 5 in the district every year in levels of giving.

The drive will go from 12/1/09 through 1/29/10 and the club goal is 100% participation of all members at \$120 per year which is just \$10 per month. Each \$100 contributed equals one entry in the drawing to be held on Friday January 29th for an immediate Paul Harris Fellow. (Members must have contributed a total of \$300 to date to be eligible for the drawing.)

The Paul Harris Fellow Recognition represents total contributions of \$1,000 to the Foundation and brings the recipient a certificate, medallion and lapel pin as well as the satisfaction of contributing to a very powerful cause.

Members can pay by check (made payable to The Rotary International Foundation) or can sign up for a monthly withdrawal through their credit card or bank.

ROTARY MINUTE

In honor of World's Aids Day on December 1, we highlighted a Rotarian from New York, Rotarian Stephen Nicholas. Rotarian Stephen Nicholas, a pioneering pediatric

AIDS specialist who helped drastically reduce infant HIV in New York City, is using Rotary as a catalyst for wiping out mother-to-child HIV transmission in the Dominican Republic.

In the early 19990s, New York City had the highest birth rate of HIV-infected children in the US. Since 2000, only a few babies in that city have been born with



the virus. This sharp drop in mother-to-child HIV transmission has largely resulted from improvements in drug treatments as well as aggressive intervention during pregnancy. "For me, the moral equation changed when I realized that infant AIDS was disappearing in the United States," say Nicholas. In 1999, Nicholas began a family AIDS clinic in La Romana, Dominican Republic. The clinic provides direct care and treatment for pregnant women with HIV. Through a World Community Service project, the Rotary Club of La Romana and Rotary Dist 7230(New York), raised US \$50,000 to help more than 100 HIV infected mothers and their newborn babies each year.

The clinic has lowered the rate of mother-to-child HIV transmission in the La Romana province from 40 percent to less than 1 percent.

"Our goal is to eliminate or greatly reduce pediatric AIDS and AIDS orphans over the next decade."
