#### **PROGRAM**

Our Youth Exchange student - Fan Chen Chiu (Jane) - gave her official presentation to the Club. Brad and Linda

Carter's family were the first host family for Jane-she has moved to her second Host Family's home. Jane is from Hualien Taiwan. Her parents own a construction company. She was active in Girl Scouts, swimming and music. Jane's father is a Rotarian. She has two older brothers who have been Youth Exchange stu-

Jane provided a beautiful pictorial overview of Taiwan. Taiwan is an island east of China (south of Japan and Koreanorth of Manila). It is approximately 36,000 sq. kilometers with a population of 23 million. The capital is Taipei city. The languages are Mandarin, Taiwanese and Hakka. Hualien is on the east side of Taiwan near the Pacific Ocean. You can see the Taiwan mountains from everywhere in the community. There are great expanses of green fields of rice growing in the area.

Jane was not used to the cold. The annual average temperature is 22 C, with the lowest temperatures from 12-17 C and the highest 40 C. That equates to an average temperature of 72, with the lowest temperatures from 53-62 F and the highest 104 F. When asked if there was snow in Taiwan she indicated that there is always snow in the mountains - like here - but it is not more that 2 cm (less than .75")

There are a number of aborigines or indigenous peoples, some still continue the traditional practices including using their own languages.

There is an extensive National Parks system in Taiwan with a goal of maintaining the unique natural environment and biodiver-

sity of the area. There are seven National Parks in Taiwan today which cover a great deal of the limited landmass of the island.

Incense is an important part of the religious traditions in Taiwan. They burn incense to signify their wishes for the future. Industry in

Taiwan includes production of the Acer Notebook Computer, largest bicycle production and very advanced in technology for vegetative reproduction. The climate also makes Taiwan perfect for various fruit production and it is sometimes called "the fruit kingdom". One of the favorite fruits in Taiwan is watermelon.

They do have Christianity in Taiwan but also many Buddhists and Taoism is present. Because they have Christians, they celebrate Christmas so Jane was familiar with the holiday and some traditions. She did say that their tradition of gift giving is usually an envelope with money - you give that give and wish the recipient good fortune and prosperity. They observe Chinese New Year so don't celebrate on December 31/January 1 as we do here in America using the Chinese Calendar it is different each year.

When asked about the food differences - she said that she misses Bubble Tea (or Pearl Milk Tea made with tapioca and shaken with tea). She indicated that she likes most foods here other than cinnamon (or foods with lots of cinnamon). She said she was amused when her brothers gained weight while they visited here but she is finding that she is too.

The Lincoln South annual Rotary International Foundation Drive is in full swing. In recent years the Foundation drive has been named for Dr. George J. Lytton, longtime member of Lincoln South who was very passionate about the cause and was instrumental in the success of the Lincoln South Drive by setting up the annual drawing to allow members to become immediate Paul Harris Fellows. Dr. Lytton is deceased but his legacy has been continued by the members in Lincoln South as we continue to rank in the top 5 in the district every year in levels of giving.

The drive will go from 12/1/09 through 1/29/10 and the club goal is 100% participation of all members at \$120 per year which is just \$10 per month. Each \$100 contributed equals one entry in the drawing to be held on Friday January 29th for an immediate Paul Harris Fellow. (Members must have contributed a total of \$300 to date to be eligible for the drawing.)

Members can pay by check (made payable to The Rotary International Foundation) or can sign up for a monthly withdrawal through their credit card or bank.




