Our speaker, Jay Palu, is with the DLR group. He is stationed in Omaha, a native of Loup City he is a graduate of UNL. He was brought to us by John Badami - architect and former member of Lincoln South Rotary Club.

The DLR group has been involved with the design phases of the proposed West Haymarket Arena. DLR has had extensive experience with projects in Nebraska. Their sports group has expanded nationwide. Their experience includes teaming with national firms that designed the Qwest Center in Omaha. The city selected DLR do to the preliminary design work which is necessary in order to get realistic cost analysis and pricing for any project. DLR subcontracted arena work to Clark Enerson Partners and Bahr Vermeer Haecker Architects of Lincoln.

DLR was paid \$1.2 million for their work. The advance spending provides security for taxpayers that the process has integrity. DLR relied heavily on advice from the Mayor and the 2015 group. They worked not only with local companies but also some national groups to compare information. Detailed drawings are needed or the price and bid ranges will vary dramatically.

There were a number of major areas addressed early on that affected the design including Moving Railroad Tracks, Pedestrian Traffic, and Vehicle Traffic. Another heavy consideration is that events that drive the income of an arena are primarily non-sports so they were careful not to compare the trends to sporting activities. Also, before settling on the current location, they did extensive study of options and experiences of other cities - suburban vs. heart of the city was discussed. Conceptual drawings were first released in October of 2009. It would be straight west of the downtown post office, anchoring a new development with P and Q streets extended to bring traffic to the area. Though we have an idea of what the arena could look like, the design is still far from final.

Environmental issues, wetlands and floodplains in the targeted area were researched before the site plans were detailed. Lincoln, by DNA guidelines, has a requirement of who is involved in this type of decision so some of the early design discussions involved as many as 60 people. It is a good process because with this many people involved up front you don't get too far into it and then find that changes are needed. The early process involved dot voting - and then a process of elimination.

There was discussion about future desires - like more pedestrian bridges, trolleys - to connect the West Haymarket area to the main part of Downtown.

There is on single solution for what an arena looks like. The outside affects the cost but not as much as the internal space, size and function. A facility such as this has high energy costs such as ice-making for hockey, and just day to day operations of the heating and AC. They are looking at ways to push down long term costs such as developing an energy efficient system - a "district" that ultimately other businesses could plug into.

From the early planning stages, there was concern for sustainability - making it last longer and cost less to operate. They would always challenge the team "how can we make smart decisions?" They also have been addressing vehicle traffic since the beginning - think about tomorrow. There has been a great deal written about the traffic and movement away from the arena following an event. Rather than large parking facilities connected to the arena that will get backed up as everyone leaves at once, there are parking areas a short distance away from the arena accessible by the planned pedestrian walkways.

As DLR was pulling this together, they looked at the best in the Country - what works well and has a reasonable budget. They drilled down to three concepts from Railroad Roundhouse to a Contemporary look. Considerations included with all three designs were Storage (imagine a restaurant feeding 16,000 people at once), expansion, parking garage to suite access, festival space, and view. With regard to ADA, they did not want to just meet ADA requirements, they wanted all areas accessible by wheel chair and aging population.

Rotary International Standard Procedure for Membership Proposal:

- I. The prospective member's name is submitted to the board of directors
- II. The board ensures that the person is fully qualified and approves or disapproves of the proposal
 - Objections are to be submitted to the club secretary (or to any other Board Member in the event the Secretary is the proposer) by the deadline posted.
 - It will be appropriate to assume approval in the absence of objections by the posted deadline.
 - The proposer is notified by the club secretary of the Board's approval (or disapproval). UNTIL THIS APPROVAL IS GRANTED, PROSPECTIVE MEMBERS SHOULD NOT BE INFORMED THAT THEY HAVE BEEN PROPOSED FOR MEMBERSHIP
- III The prospective member's name is published to the club
 - If no objections are received by the deadline following the publication of the name, that person, upon payment of an admission fee (secured by the proposer) is a new Rotarian
- IV The prospective member is informed of privileges and responsibilities of the club membership by proposer.
 - He or she is then asked to complete the membership application form and submit along with their dues payment.
- V. Any and all communications within these procedures may be in person, in writing, by phone, by fax, by email, or by any other physical or electronic means available to the Board Member.

ROTARY MINUTE

Longtime friend of Rotary -- the <u>Boy Scouts of America</u> -- marked its 100th birthday on 8 February.

The two organizations have worked together since their early days. Rotary founder Paul Harris, after meeting with Chief Scout Executive James E. West in 1910, urged Rotarians to assist in the expansion of the Scouts. By 1930, Rotarians had organized more than half of the then 500 Boy Scout councils, and today Rotary clubs sponsor 1,483 Scout units for 45,528 youth.



Rotary clubs have also contributed financially to Scout troops and helped construct Boy Scout camp buildings. Individual Rotarians have led the Scouts at local, district, and national levels.

"It makes good sense that Rotary would be involved in helping make the community a good place by starting out young," says Mike Birkholm, a member of the Rotary Club of Los Angeles and chair of the Inter-American Region of the International Fellowship of Scouting Rotarians, a network of 1,200 Rotarians who are also involved in Scouting. The fellowship counts RI President John Kenny and past presidents Wilf Wilkinson, Bill Boyd, and Cliff Dochterman among its members. "Scouting is a great way for Rotary to grow itself into the future."

Kenny said being a Boy Scout led him toward Rotary. "The Scout organization is a tremendous organization for young people," he said. "I've often been speaking at a Rotary club and have asked, 'Just put your hand up if you were a Scout.' And I found that at least half of the audience put their hands up."

In honor of the Boy Scouts of America centennial, Chief Scout Executive Bob Mazzuca will address the <u>2010 RI Convention in Montréal</u>, <u>Quebec</u>, <u>Canada</u>. The Boy Scouts have taken part in RI conventions before. In 1934, Walter W. Head, president of the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America, presented Paul Harris with the Scouts' highest honor, the Silver Buffalo Award. At the 1984 convention, the World Organization of the Scout Movement received the Rotary Award for World Understanding and Peace.

"The values of Scout Law, the Scout Oath, and The Four-Way Test are very similar," notes Al Kugler, director of the Office of the Chief Scout Executive. The Scout Oath is a promise that Scouts make to, among other things, "help other people at all times."

The Boy Scouts of America is part of the worldwide Scouting movement that began in Great Britain in 1907. International Scouting has more than 28 million members in 160 countries. In the United States, 1.2 million adults volunteer with the Boy Scouts to serve 4.1 million youth every year.
