

day. There are 2 types of addiction: Chemical addictions which include alcohol and substances and Process addictions which include sex, gambling, exercise, food, work and money. Sex addiction is a pathological relawith tionship



mood-altering experience and is also viewed as an intimacy and relationship disorder.

All addictions rely on the pleasure centers in the brain and the brains of addicts have shorter dopamine strands which inhibit the dopamine flow. This results in cravings or behaviors to stimulate dopamine production. A person must possess at least 3 of 10 criteria to be classified as a sex addict: 1. Loss of control, 2. Compulsive, 3. Unsuccessful efforts to stop or cut down, 4. Preoccupation, 5. Loss of time, 6. Inability to fulfill obligations, 7. Continue despite the consequences, 8. Escalation, 9. Losses and 10. Withdrawal.

There are 3 levels of addiction ranging from use of pornography, to exhibitionism to rape and child molestation. Most sex addicts usually progress from level 1 to level 2 but most do not progress to level 3. The

average sex addict is a white male between the ages of 25-72. This could be skewed by the fact that most women do not seek help so they are not part of the statistics. It is estimated that 10% of the general popula-

tion has a problem with sex addiction.

The advent of the internet has exponentially increased access to sexually explicit materials. Cybersex is extremely addictive because of the virtual anonymity of the internet. In fact porn revenue far exceeds the combined revenues of all professional football, baseball and basketball and is larger than the com-

bined revenues of ABC, CBS and NBC. 72 million people worldwide will visit porn sites this year and believe it or not, most porn is downloaded between the hours of 9 to 5.

The treatment of sex addiction first requires a thorough assessment which could include some tools developed by Dr. Patrick Carnes such as a Sex Addiction Screening Test, Sexual Dependency Inventory and a Post Traumatic Stress Index. A history of addiction in the family can be a factor as well as being emotional or prone to anxiety. Also a childhood trauma can result in addictive behaviors as an adult. Treatment includes a 12 step program just like treatment for alcohol and drug addiction and therapy with a certified sex addiction therapist.

ROTARY MINUTE

On 3 September 1970, cancer took the life of Vince Lombardi, now regarded as the greatest football coach of all time. Soon after, a football fan in Houston named Rick Ashburn approached the Rotary Club of Houston about sponsoring an award in Lombardi's honor, and the club grabbed the ball and ran. That December, at a dinner benefiting the American Cancer Society, the Houston club's first Lombardi Award was presented to Jim Stillwagon, a lineman at Ohio State University. U.S. Vice President Spiro Agnew was the featured speaker.



In a little over four months, the club had tackled logistics ranging from establishing a blue-ribbon selection committee to securing permission from Lombardi's widow, Marie – who insisted that the proceeds fund cancer research – to designing the trophy itself. Lombardi's nephew Steve Werner, a member of the Rotary Club of Denver Southeast, Colo., recalls the story behind the award. During Lombardi's days at Fordham University in the 1930s, he played on the legendary offensive line known as the "Seven Blocks of Granite." At the suggestion of Lombardi's sister Madeline (Werner's mother), the trophy incorporates that stone. Designed by Mark Storm of the Houston club, the 40-pound block of granite is engraved with a word closely associated with the coach: discipline.

Today, the Lombardi Award is one of the most prestigious in college sports, and on 9 December, the 40th trophy was presented to the nation's outstanding college football lineman: Ndamukong Suh, a defensive tackle at the University of Nebraska. The presentation featured Vince Lombardi Jr. and was the subject of a Fox Sports television special called "40 Blocks of Granite."

Former Green Bay Packers offensive lineman Jerry Kramer and quarterback Bart Starr teamed up again to speak at the event honoring their former coach. Kramer delivered perhaps the most famous block in football history, in the National Football League championship game at Lambeau Field in Green Bay, Wisconsin, on 31 December 1967 – dubbed the "Ice Bowl" because it was played in subzero temperatures. Lombardi's Packers beat the Dallas Cowboys in the waning seconds on a 1-yard dive by Starr behind Kramer's block.

"I feel very good about having been part of the Lombardi era on the field and very good to be associated with this award and all that it represents," says Kramer. "There was such a positive message from Coach Lombardi and his wife. It's all about can-do, can-make-it-happen – fairly, squarely, decently, by the rules, with class and dignity."
