PROGRAM

Lance Odom introduced Clay Naff who is the Executive Director of the Lincoln Literacy Council. Mr. Naff is a published author and has traveled extensively. Most recently he has traveled to Italy. Lance

states that he is the "most effective administrator to work with."

The program was titled "A Prosperous Future for Lincoln: Challenges and Opportunities. Mr. Naff says that prosperity has three components: creating a risk rewarding environment, attracting and retaining

a skilled workforce and nurturing a sense of community. Lincoln can count on the many pluses that it has including the innovation campus, a high business start up rate, a high graduated rate, a low cost of business entry and a strong business infrastructure.

There are some minuses to consider also. Those include a high rate of brain drain. Thirty three percent of UNL graduates leave the state. There is an aging local population. Currently there is 14.6 % of the population that are over 60 years of age. There is a rapid influx of new Americans which accounts for 11 per cent. And there is a very tight labor market.

Lincoln is considered to have full employment because the unemployment rate is so low at 4.9 per cent. However that is no guarantee of prosperity. Are the skills of our workforce meeting our needs? Global competition is where growth will be. Low skilled jobs persist and wages may remain stagnant.

Immigration will be how Nebraska will grow. There are over 60 countries represented in Lincoln. Included in that list of countries are Iran, Sudan, Mexico, Vietnam, Burma, Russia, Iraq, Turkey, Congo, Burma, and many other Middle Eastern countries. Many refugees do not speak English. The growth of the number of refugees is reflected in the fact that they are fleeing their respective countries and they are admitted legally. Refugees experience a lot of poverty. They have

> little experience with the modern world.

> According to Mr. Naff, the goal of the Lincoln Literacy Council is to assist all cultures to achieve the ability to read and write in English. The Council was form in 1972 with all volunteers. In 1976, the Council added English as a Second

Language classes. By 1992 the Council was established as a 501 (c)(3) non-profit organization. Currently the annual budget is \$330,000. There are 12 employees full and part time.

Lincoln Literacy Council partners in the community with churches, ethnic agencies, schools and community centers to achieve its mission. There are over 200 volunteers that teach reading, writing, ESL and other classes. Some of the other classes include citizenship, family literacy, health literacy and workforce readiness.

"English is the key to successful integration" according to Mr. Naff. He states that failure is not an option for new prospective citizens. The newcomers represent long term burdens or untapped potential.

Immigration is controversial. But one must consider the moral obligations. Newcomers must be literate in English in order to be successful. Mr. Naff encouraged the group to become a member a tutor or both. To learn more about the Lincoln Literacy Council, go to lincolnliteracy.org.
