

Health Care Services was our speaker. Chan has been with Tabitha for 2 years and talked to the club about services offered at Tabitha as well as the future of eldercare whith is a changing industry.

Chan remembers an early connection to Tabitha when in 1955, his great grandfather moved to Tabitha and the family vis-

ited him frequently. Tabitha was founded 123 years ago as an orphanage which also served the elderly. In the 1960's the orphanage was closed and Tabitha focused only on the elderly. Some of the programs and services offered by Tabitha are as follows.

Life Quest is a rehab facility offering Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Speech Therapy on both an inpatient and outpatient basis for all ages. The revenue from the rehab center offsets losses that Tabitha incurs in other areas where they serve everyone regardless of ability to pay.

Home Care is the future for baby boomers who want to age in their homes. Tabitha offers Home Care and home Health Care in 29 counties.

Hospice Care—end of life care also offered in 29 counties.

Meals on Wheels—Tabitha delivers a noon meal 7 days per week, 365 days per year for \$5.75 per meal. However 50% of the meals on wheels recipients



pay 0\$ and 20% pay only a portion of the price so Tabitha loses approximately

\$125,000 per year on the program. He indicated they will never discontinue the program however and thanked Lincoln South for volunteering to deliver the meals.

Tabitha also offers nursing & rehab, Long Term care, transitional care and Hospice, and Alzheimer care. Tabitha has 2 independent living facilities which are HUD subsidized housing and they offer Adult Day Care.

Green House—Tabitha was the first in the country to offer Long Term care in a residential setting when they built their first Green House. It has private bedrooms with private baths and a common dining room, library and patio. The meals are fixed on site in a central kitchen. The medical outcomes for patients in this setting have increased dramatically during the 3 years the facility has been open.

Chan then spoke to the club about Tabitha's plans for the future which include remodeling the entrance, addition of assisted living facilities, 3 more Green Houses with one focusing on Alzheimer's patients and conversion of freed up space to more private rooms, semi skilled and rehab space.
