At the moment I have real concern and a prayer for the 33 Chilean miners who have been trapped underground and will begin being rescued at dawn today. In was a herculean effort to drill and line the 2000 ft plus shaft and cre-

ate the rescue pod that will deliver miners to the surface one by one where their families are waiting.

It reminds me a bit of baby Jessica who had fallen down an abandon well hole a few years ago. The entire country and probably much of the world watched 24 coverage of her lengthy but ultimately safe rescue. Rotary does not engage in such dramatic rescues but it is able to efficiently and quickly respond to a variety of domestic and international concerns some of which are in fact emergencies. Maybe because it is composed of people in the business community who know how to run organizations it is a bit better run than most organizations. Even in the Rotary matching grant we received there are checks and balances built in to the process so people can be assured that the intent of the grant is realized. It is nice to be part of something that is both purposeful and well run. PROGRAM

Lincoln South's own Nikki Isemann spoke to the club about her trip to the Rotary International convention in Montreal Canada. One of the main reasons that Nikki chose to attend the convention this year is that the incoming RI president, Ray Klinginsmith sponsored Nikki when she was a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar and was her mentor.

Canada is the country that made Rotary International, and this year marks the 100th anniversary of the first meeting of the Rotary Club of Winnipeg, Manitoba -- the first club established outside the United States. Opening Ceremonies were like the Olympic Games with a parade of flags and in fact Canada recycled the Vancouver Olympic Ceremony for the convention. There were more than 18,000 attendees from 154 countries and geographical areas.

John Kenny, the outgoing RI president spoke to the convention praising the projects he witnessed during his travels throughout the year, reminding all "I have always believed that the real work of Rotary, the work I have seen in this past year, was not done by me or by any member of the Board of Directors of Rotary International," he said. "It was done by you -- in every one of your districts, in every one of your clubs, and in every one of your communities." Some of the projects included the Shelterbox project used for Haiti earthquake victims, Project Heart Surgery in Hungary, drinkable water in Brazilian River villages, and a visit to Latvia where the last RI president to visit was Paul Harris in 1932. He also stated that thanks to the enthusiastic efforts of clubs and districts. Rotarians have raised \$131.5 million toward the \$200 million challenge from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation as of 27 May. On Rotary's birthday, 23 February, clubs worldwide lit up 25 landmarks —

from the Egyptian pyramids to the Tower of London — with the End Polio Now logo

As always the House of Friendship was a focal point of the convention where clubs from all over the world displayed information about their activities and projects.

There were several high profile speakers including Queen Noor of Jordan and author Greg Mortenson, co-founder of the Central Asia Institute who discussed global challenges to building peace in the 21st Century and Dolly Parton who has a literacy project. Incoming president Ray Klinginsmith is known for his direct and logical approach and his "cowboy logic" which was reflected in the following poem:

There's a great American hero, we all look up to

When the times are hard and the chips are down,

He knows just what to do Now a cowboy's got a set of rules that he lives by day to day If you ask for his advice, he'll more than likely say

If it's a fence, mend it. If it's a dollar bill, spend it

Before it burns a hole down in them jeans It it's a load, truck it. If it's a punch, duck it.

If she's a lady, treat her like a queen

That's cowboy logic, every cowboy's got it It's in the way he lives his life and the songs he sings That's cowboy logic, every cowboy's got it He's got a simple solution to just about
