PRESIDENT'S CORNER



Having had Egyptian students matriculating at Southeast Community College I was very interested in the turn of events there leading to the overthrow of the Mubarak government. Now governmental discontent has spread to Bahrain, Iran and several other countries. A consistent theme is emerging of frustration with long standing leaders. I was reminded recently how

George Washington had an opportunity to run for a 3rd term as president of the United States. He was very popular and would have won. Some said he could have been king but he resisted that temptation remembering how hard he had fought to create a democratic republic. At the time there was no constitutional bar to Washington seeking a 3rd or even 4th term. Later Franklin Roosevelt navigated the United States through WWII and actually won a 4th term in office. However, only weeks into his 4th term he died after an exhausting schedule and a trip to Yalta. Roosevelt was tired but he relished the leadership role. Recognizing the peril of continuously reelecting the same leaders congress set Presidential term limits in 1951 with the 22nd amendment to the US Constitution.

It seems to me that both "developed" and "developing" countries and really all organizations are served by striking a reasonable balance between experience and entrenchment. There are two competing principles here: 1) Knowledge is power and 2) Power corrupts (at least absolute power).

Don't re-elect me next year :))



Fink and Linda Arnold. Linda has been an art volunteer at the Northeast Family Center for about 2 years working with children at the Early Learning Center and their sites at Brownell Elementary and Norwood park Elementary. In the past year she has started

a program offering art classes

to residents in Lincoln area adult homes. She has a weekly art club at Mahoney Manor, one at Lancaster Manor and will be starting one a Burke Plaza in March. In addition the Northeast Center holds an Art Family get together every Sunday from 1 to 4 in the afternoon so fami-

lies can come to learn how to communicate through art.

Ramona has worked some at the Northeast Family Center for about 10 years. She also has presented art classes at Northeast Family's Early Learning Center and Brownell and Norwood park.

Ramona and Linda spoke to the club about the art program that they are in the process of building and the impact is has on

municate through art. Ramona shared a story about some women that she helped at Lancaster Manor who had MS and how the program helped them to do things they never though they could do. The message from both Ramona and Linda is "Everyone is an Artist" and how their students can't believe that they can do the things they learn to do.

Ramona and Linda fund all of the art supplies out of their personal funds so they can offer the program at no cost to the participants. They target the underserved or those who don't have the funds or physical abilities to take an art class.

They are just starting the process to expand the program by looking for volunteers to help with the program as well as to donate art supplies. Their goal is to focus the program on teaching the techniques of fine art rather than an arts and crafts focus.
