Jason Smith introduced our program today which is about FUSE Coworking, and interesting new way that people are working.

Robert Hinrichs, a FUSE founder, moved to Lincoln in 2010, with hopes to contribute something significant to Lincoln's startup community. He founded ISL Consulting in San Francisco, a Web development agency, which was acquired in 2012 by Clear-Metrics, a New York technology and creative company with an entrepreneurial mission, where Robert serves as CTO.

FUSE is a coworking space where Lincoln's knowledge-workers, creatives and technologists can come and work in an exciting, stimulating professional environment that provides collaboration, community and creativity. It provides a forum for sharing ideas in a flexible working environment.

Coworking is a new way to work. It is also a very old way to work. When human beings collect and practice their talents in a place that serves as a melting pot of ideas, there is a greater chance that those ideas and resources will create energy and excitement that produces outcomes that you may not be able to accomplish alone. FUSE is providing a place for like-minded individuals to work together, while being independent.

In our current world we are challenged, yet blessed, with economic issues, technology and globalization. The workplace is changing. Many people are able to work internationally from a single location.

One problem with working from home is that we often find that we are not as productive when we work in isolation. There are more distractions and we need people around us to bounce off ideas and spur on creativity.

There are over 7,000 coworking spaces worldwide. In many communities, they grew out of necessity - lack of space and the need to put more workers into less space. Lincoln does not have that problem. But, individuals who work in the environment in Lincoln can easily move into the same type of environment in other cities around the world.

The current generation of college graduates grew up with computers and they are used to flexibility and they are looking for that in their work environment. They are also expecting to be judged by results, not the hours worked. Coworking can provide the bridge between some of the traditional ways of working and the latest thinking.

Coworking is more than just sharing office space - it takes it to the next step. FUSE is about community. You are provided with a community within the work space. FUSE also interacts with the community of Lincoln to get and share ideas. The communities can create a dynamic synergy. Bob sees Lincoln as an excellent location for this type of business - thriving community, culture and economy. He described Lincoln as a community of trusting individuals where we help each other. Coworking communities survive because of the host community - it makes it easy for people to move between coworking and other jobs as individuals change and grow in their careers. He hopes that this will help create one more reason for young professionals to stay in Lincoln.

Memberships are either daily or month-to -month, there's no setup fee, and you can cancel at any time. Fuse Coworking provides desks, meeting rooms and wi-fi. They can provide a business mailing address. The key is flexibility. As a member you include other benefits including networking events that include the public and meetings with business speakers. The public can also request to rent the conference rooms (from 3-8 people around a table or 24 in chairs), which include the latest technology.
