



Reach Within to Embrace Humanity

PROGRAM

Nicki Klein introduced Dr. Juliann Sebastian who is the Dean of the UNMC College of Nursing effective October 15, 2011. She has previously served as a dean and professor of the University of Missouri-St. Louis college of Nursing. According to

Chancellor Maurer of UNMC: "Dr. Sebastian is an expert in organization of care delivery systems, care for underserved populations, academic nursing practice and nursemanaged centers."

The process of Building a Healthier Nebraska is a UNL Legislative Initiative of 2012. It is an ef-

fort to meet future demand in Nebraska for facilities, education, and serving an aging population.

The future growth in Nebraska is expected to be 3-4% inpatient services and 5-7% outpatient services.

The importance of the Cancer Project will include: the impact of economic vitality, positions the project for comprehensive cancer center designation, will create new opportunities for breakthroughs in cancer diagnoses and treatment, and will improve quality of life in Nebraska.

One out of 2 people are affected by cancer. Additional growth will be due to the aging population. The request to fund this project will be to serve Nebraskans because cancer is a group of illnesses, it is a chronic illness which is more treatable and many can live with it.

Future demand needs will be met by new buildings which will create 108 additional beds dedicated to cancer patients, a research center and an outpatient center. Of the 370 million dollars requested, the research tower will take \$110 million. There will be additional private fundraising and the state will contribute \$50 million. The new jobs created by this project

will be around 1200. The annual salaries and benefits will contribute \$100 million to the economy.

There will be a serious shortfall of Registered Nurses by 2020. The shortfall will be about 3830 positions and primarily will affect rural counties in our state. Cur-

rently there are 14 schools of nursing in Nebraska. Although the reason is unclear, the enrollment for nursing students fell in 2008 and it has not yet rebounded.

The Kearney Division of the College of Nursing was founded in 1991. The current facilities are inadequate. Another program call Allied Health was started in 1972. It is a key pro-

gram and serves to educate twelve professions including physical therapy and Physician's Assistant programs. Another piece of the programming is the Veterinary Diagnostic Lab, which is an accurate and timely diagnostic tool.

The total impact of the three pieces of programs and funding will be 1200 new jobs created, over \$100 million in payroll, 29 new faculty positions, \$2.8 million in payroll impact and will help to eradicate the nursing shortage.

Currently UNMC is turning away over 60% of qualified applicants due to facility and faculty shortages. This effort will expand space and fund faculty positions.

Her concluding remarks were:

"Our job for you is to educate Nebraskans to excel in a global community through science, humanities, leadership and civic engagement."

UNMC must generate scientific breakthroughs and deploy them to improve quality of life in Nebraska and beyond. And prepare the workforce of the future while educating students to create the future."

A question and answer session followed the presentation.
