Polio Fundraiser—Aaron Babcock has contributed Husker Illustrated yearbooks to be sold at \$10 apiece as a fundraiser for Polio with 100% of the proceeds benefitting the End Polio Now Campaign as well as other activities of Lincoln South Rotary.

End Polio Now Event—Nicki Klein reported Lincoln is very close to its goal for raising its portion of the \$200 million Challenge Grant to Rotary International from the Bill Gates. To raise the remainder of the funds, the Lincoln Rotary Clubs have scheduled a "Strike Out Polio" event at the Salt Dogs game on August 19th. Tickets for the club section behind home plate will be \$16 each with 1/2 of the proceeds going to polio eradication. The goal is to sell 243 tickets which is the capacity of the club section. There also will be opportunities to qualify to throw out the first pitch. See page 4 for Flyer with details.

PROGRAM

Our presentation started with a slide show of photos of Husker football. That certainly got us in the mood for the new football season! Aaron Babcock, the General Manager / Editor of Huskers Illustrated was our speaker. Aaron has held this position for three years. He oversees the production of the magazine and all business and marketing efforts.

Prior to taking over Huskers Illustrated, Aaron served as the Director of Media Relations for the Kansas City Royals and also worked in the Nebraska Sports Information office. He is also the owner of Barnstorm Creative Marketing where he has clients such as the New York Yankees and the Husker Sports Network.

The photos that Aaron showed us were taken by photographers of Huskers Illustrated – so we got some of our last images of Nebraska playing in the Big 12. The photos were fabulous and demonstrated the skills and talents of the Huskers Illus-

trated photography staff. Aaron stated that they are constantly striving for better photos to help them stand out.

Aaron wanted to dispel one myth – that Huskers Illustrated is affiliated with the University of Nebraska. There is no affiliation, though there is good cooperation between the magazine and UNL.

Aaron discussed the staff which includes him as General Manager, a contributing Editor, a Website manager, Recruiting editor and two additional photographers. They also have two people who do radio shows.

When Huskers Illustrated started 30 years ago it was just a magazine that published 6 issues per year. Three (3) years ago they decided to expand the brand. They realized that the magazine had a lot of respect, but needed to go through a redesign. They also wanted to introduce new ideas and distribution methods.

One of the first things they did was offer the magazine in digital format – it saves trees and the subscribers can get it earlier. They can deliver to an iPad which appeals to younger readers, many of whom have never read a newspaper or much of anything in print.

In 1994 they launched the website and are now regarded as the premier recruiting website. Anyone can subscribe to the website and stay up on the latest inside information.

Radio is new to Huskers Illustrated. They tested the waters by producing a podcast that was published through iTunes. Station 1620 in Omaha heard it – wanted it – and put it on the air at 7:00 AM on Saturday mornings. This is not normally a good listener time slot but is perfect for football Saturday drive time. The Huskers Illustrated radio

show is now also on 1480 in the 4-6 PM timeslot.

When Aaron took over the publication, there was no advertising. Bo Pelini was just coming on board and people were disenchanted with the Huskers so were cutting back on spending. It was important to show advertisers the value of their dollars and make sure that they had exposure through multiple outlets.

It's not "your Dad's Huskers Illustrated" - today:

- - more than 7,000 subscribers; nearly 30,000 readers each issue

- - Yearbook – 25,000 are printed, distributed to bookstores throughout the state; ready by over 75,000

- - web features photo galleries, recruiting video profiles, message board

Coverage is 90% football, then volleyball, then baseball and then men's basketball. They let the success of the team and reader demand dictate what they publish.

Aaron also offered his impression of the Big 10. He has followed them for a number of years. He has always felt they were more professional – top notch. It is like going from AAA baseball to the big leagues. He believes that Nebraska will be a good fit. The schedule will be tough but it is overall a good move. He indicated that Nebraska has wanted to be in the Big 10 for years and the stars finally aligned to make it happen.

When asked about the photographers, Aaron indicated that many of the photos are taken by him. He has two other photographers – one used to be a staff photographer for the Journal Star. The other is an official photographer for UNL. Photos are copyrighted to UNL with permission given to Huskers Illustrated to publish them.

Aaron shoots between 1,500 and 2,000 photos per football game. The other photographers may take up to 200. It can take up to an hour to download the photos from a single football game.

When shooting photos for sports, it is considered editorial coverage so anything can be published. If you are in attendance, you are in a public place, again if it is being shot for editorial coverage they do not need to get releases. If they would choose to print a photo for use as an ad, etc. then they would need to get releases.

During a typical football game publication:

- - the magazine is typically 56 pages, 40 pages will be sent to the publisher ahead of time

- - one photographer shoots the first half of the game, then goes to work downloading photos

- - immediately after the game, reporters do the interviews, while the photographers wrap up their photos

- - They start putting the magazine together – usually takes 10 to 12 hours

- - It is on the press by 10:00 AM Sunday to be mailed out Monday morning $% \left({{{\rm{N}}_{\rm{B}}}} \right)$

(Aaron admitted he did not like night games very much because of the need to get to the press by 10:00 AM the next morning.)
