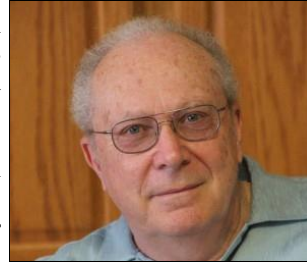

Bob Ferguson came to us through the Humanities Nebraska Speaker's Bureau. Bob has a B.A. in History and an M.A. in Education from the University of Rochester, N.Y. He was a Peace Corps Volunteer in Colombia, taught high school social studies, and recently retired as the Program Assistant for Humanities Nebraska. He has been a stamp collector for many years.



Bob's focus for the meeting was on stamps depicting the State of Nebraska or information about Nebraska / Nebraskans. Bob displayed the stamps on TV screens which made the colors stand out and you could see the stamp details. But, he started by showing us a Rotary Stamp from the 50 year anniversary of Rotary International in 1955. He pointed out that we can no longer get a commemorative stamp for Rotary, citing this statement in the guidelines "Due to the limitations placed on annual postal programs and the vast number of such locales, organizations and institutions in existence, it would be difficult to single out any one of the following for commemoration: government agencies, localities, non-profit organizations, associations, and similar entities. Stamps or stationery items shall not be issued to honor religious institutions or individuals whose principal achievements are associated with religious undertakings or benefits."

There is a Citizen's Stamp Advisory Committee appointed by the Postmaster General. The Rotary Stamp is an example of an engraved, single color stamp. The engraving method begins with the creation of a "master die" in which the design of the stamp is engraved, in reverse. This is a hand process, in which the engraver is carefully cutting a mirror image of the original drawing for the stamp. After the die has been completed, a transfer roll consisting of soft steel wrapped around a rod is created. This roll is then used to create the stamp.

Many look at stamps as mini works of art. When they are created, the artist creates a full-size painting or drawing. They are then reduce in size to make the stamps.

We also learned about the first day cover - a stamped envelope, postal card or other postal

material that was processed and cancelled at the post office where the stamp was issued. The cancellation is often designed for the occasion and frequently will say "First Day of Issue". Often included is additional artwork (cachet) added to the envelope, complementing the stamp subject.

Focusing on Nebraska and how our state has been represented on stamps, Bob shared . . .

Arbor Day was the subject of a stamp in 1932 which was the 60th anniversary of Arbor Day. 1932 also happened to be the 100th anniversary of the birth of J. Sterling Morton who founded Arbor Day. The first day cover for this stamp was Nebraska City.

Fort Kearney was depicted in a 1948 engraved 3 cent stamp. Fort Kearney is one of the first of many forts set up to protect settlers along the Oregon Trail. It was the first fort after St. Louis along the trail where provisions could be purchased. The first day cover shows the cancellation of Minden, Nebraska.

Commemorating the 100th anniversary of Nebraska becoming a territory there was a stamp issued in 1954. It was an engraved stamp and the first day cover was in Nebraska City, the first city established in the Nebraska territory.

In 1962 there was a 4 cent stamp in celebration of the 100th anniversary of the Homestead Act. There was a ceremony at the Homestead National Monument, the first day cover has a Beatrice postmark. It has been noted that Norway used the same image on a stamp depicting immigration to America.

Nebraska State History has been depicted on stamps commemorating every 50 years. These have included many pioneer themes and iconic images from Nebraska. Our next one will be in 2017. There hasn't been any information about the design of the stamp.

In 1982 State Birds and Flowers were created and sold in 50-stamp sheets. The original art was water color paintings done by a father and son team (Arthur and Alan Singer) from New York.

In 2001 there was a 70 cent Air Mail stamp with the picture of the Nine Mile Prairie. This stamp was created from a photograph by Michael Forsberg. Nine-Mile Prairie is a 230-acre tallgrass prairie owned by the University of Nebraska Foundation. The prairie is preserved in its natural state and used for educational purposes.

There was a series of stamps issued in 2002 titled Greetings from America. These stamps were created from color illustrations by an artist from North Carolina. The Nebraska stamp carried a pioneer theme.

The Flags of our Nation stamps were issued in 2010.

There are a number of people with ties to Nebraska depicted on stamps. Bob mentioned these people from the Nebraska Hall of Fame that are on stamps:

George Norris
General John Pershing
Willa Cather

Father Flannigan
William Jennings Bryan
Red Cloud
Buffalo Bill Cody – 2 stamps

Others born in Nebraska, but not in the Hall of Fame:

Harold Lloyd of silent films born in Burdard
Malcolm X born in Omaha
Henry Fonda born in Grand Island

We had a short discussion about the Nebraska Hall of Fame process. The purpose of the Nebraska Hall of Fame is to bring public attention to, and officially recognize, people who, in their lives, have achieved prominence and who were outstanding Nebraskans. Nebraskans mean those (1) who were born in Nebraska; (2) who gained prominence while living in Nebraska, or; (3) who lived in Nebraska and whose residence in Nebraska was an important influence on their lives and which contributed to their greatness. Inductees are added every 5 years with the next selection in 2019. Any citizen can nominate candidates.

It so happens that District Governor Rod Bates is on the Nebraska Hall of Fame Commission.
