




PROGRAM

Nicki Klein, Lincoln South Executive Director, presented the program on "What Club Service Means to Club Success." She stated that August is Rotary Membership Month. Club members will be reminded through Friday programs and guest speakers about the value of membership

in Rotary this month.

She talked about the Mission of Rotary which is to provide service to others, promote integrity and advance world unders tanding, goodwill and peace.



Rotarians recognize the value of diversity within an individual club. It is encouraged under membership guidelines to find an appropriate range of individuals with regard to professional and business classification, age, gender, religion, and ethnicity.

The Four Way Test of the things we think say or do: Is it the Truth? Is it fair to all concerned? Will it build goodwill and better friendships? Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideals of service as a basis of worthy enterprise. Rotarians are expected to encourage and foster:

- 1. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service,
- 2. Provide high ethical standards in business and professions,
- 3. The application of service in every Rotarian's personal, business and community life, and
- 4. Advance international understanding, goodwill and peace.

The Five Avenues of Service include: Club Service, Vocational Service, Community Service, International Service and New Generations.

Club service strengthens the fellowship of

members and promotes the effective functioning of the Club.

Club service is responsible for running meetings, fundraising, communications, membership and training.

Activities and awards recognize the efforts of members to promote their club within

and in the community. The current Rotary International motto is Peace through Understanding. The RI president has suggested the following goals for clubs: achieve the presidential challenge, strengthen clubs, increase service and enhance the public image of your club.

Creating the action plan should include club assessment, outreach and

recruitment. Clubs should participate in a sustainable international project which could include peace efforts, disease prevention, water and health, education, and economic projects.

Additional Club activities include the support of Polio eradication and the RI Foundation of 100% member participation.

New Generations is an effort to recognize positive change implemented by youth and young adults through leadership development activities such as RYLA, Rotaract and Interact, service projects and creating international understanding with Rotary Youth Exchange. Lincoln South Club members under the leadership of Tom Cardwell provided valuable support to the implementation of RYLA in April of 2012. Future involvement is expected to continue.

She briefly discussed the Rotary 108 program in which members earn points to help their club achieve awards at the District level. Points can be awarded for attendance at local and District meetings, service projects, and foundation support.

Nicki concluded the program by stating everyone's help is needed to make it happen
