
PRESIDENT'S CORNER



Jim Dutton, Operations Specialist at the Lincoln Electric System ("LES") Terry Bundy Generating Sta-

tion was our speaker. LES is publicly owned and serves 200 square miles with 449 employees. It shares many generation facilities with other utilities and has local generating plants at Rokeby, 8th & J, Terry Bundy on $27 \mathrm{th}$



The peak load for electricity use for Lincoln is about 786 megawatts per hour which compares to an hourly average of 354 megawatts. One home uses about 3.2 kilowatts per hour. 1 megawatt powers about 310 homes. The mission is to match the generation levels with the load. They follow the load throughout the day and generation plants kick in at different times of the day to fill the load so it is seamless to the customers.

The generation plants are categorized 3 ways:

Base Load Plants—These plants have the lowest energy costs since they run all the time but they have the highest capital cost.

Intermediate Load Plants—These plants are seasonal and run about 12 hrs per day to accommodate additional daily peaks of use at certain times of the day. The have medium capital and energy cost.

Peaking Plants—These are seasonal and only kick in during peak usage at certain times of the year, running about 5 hours per day. As a result they have the highest

> energy cost since they don't run all the time but they have low capital cost.

> The wind turbines are not owned by LES but they have power purchase agreements with wind farms.

> The Terry Bundy generation plant is a zero discharge facility. The generation pro-

cess takes 1.75 million gallons of water per day which is pumped from a nearby wastewater treatment plant. Once used by the facility, the water is collected and pumped back to the wastewater treatment plant. The Terry Bundy plant also has the cleanest emissions of any plant in Nebraska. The plant has 3 gas turbines, 1 steam turbine, 3 landfill gas engines, and 1 emergency diesel generator.

As such the plant is a combined cycle plant using both gas and steam to generate power. Exhaust from the gas turbines is used to make steam which is used in the steam turbine. Then water from the steam turbine is cycled back to the boiler to make more steam.

One of their newest technologies is their is their landfill gas to energy program where they pipe in methane gas from the landfill into their landfill gas engines which are used to power the generation of electricity.
