### ABC's of Rotary—THE OFFICIAL ROTARY FLAG

An official flag was formally adopted by Rotary International at the 1929 Convention in Dallas, Texas. The Rotary flag consists of a white field with the official wheel emblem emblazoned in gold in the center of the field. The four depressed spaces on the rim of the Rotary wheel are colored royal blue. The words "Rotary" and "International" are printed at the top and the bottom depressions on the wheel rim are also gold. The shaft in the hub and the keyway of the wheel are white.

The 1st official Rotary flag reportedly was flown in Kansas City, Missouri, in January 1915. In 1922 a small Rotary flag was carried over the South Pole by Admiral Richard Byrd, a member of the Winchester, Virginia, Rotary Club. Four years later, the admiral carried a Rotary flag in his expedition to the North Pole.

Some Rotary clubs use the official Rotary flag as a banner at club meetings. In these instances it is appropriate to print the words "Rotary Club" above the wheel symbol, and the name of the city, state or nation below the emblem. The rotary flag is always prominently displayed at the World Headquarters as well as at all conventions and official events of Rotary International.

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#### **PROGRAM**

Mary Barton who is a volunteer for Bridges of Hope was our speaker. Bridges of Hope is resource agency for the formerly incarcerated or soon to be released from prison. It grew from a program started by the pastor at Sheridan Lutheran Church.

Their mission is to accompany former offenders while they are moving

out of correctional institutions and into the community.

M o s t prisoners are released with a change of clothes and \$100. They have no place to live, no job and may have no oth-

er civilian clothes, personal items or items needed to set up a home. Bridges of Hope has a 4,800 square foot warehouse which is stocked with essential items to set up a home after release from incarceration such as clothing, hygiene products, household items, kitchen items, microwaves, furniture, bedding and towels to name a few.

They serve men & women released from incarceration within the last 12 months. They are allowed to shop twice at the warehouse for needed items. They served 500 people in 2012.

The goal of the program is to help former offenders transition into the community and hopefully lower recidivism. Some statistics show why this is important. The 2012 budget for the Nebraska Dept. of Corrections was \$158 million. Each inmate costs approx. \$35,000 per

year. All 10 prisons in Nebraska are over capacity with a total 4,400-4,700 people in Nebraska prisons right now. 1 in every 31 adults in the US is either in prison, on parole or on probation.

Convicted felons face many challenges when they are released including job ineligibility, housing ineligibility and public assistance ineligibility. Bridges of

> What can you do? You can donate time, cash or goods. Community groups

such as Rotary can help organize the gathering of garage sale leftovers, arrange for pick up and delivery of donated items etc. or raise funds. Some of the items particularly needed right now are men and women's clothing in large sizes, men's shoes, esp. work boots, jackets, belts, women's underwear, esp. bras, unopened hygiene products, laundry and dish soap, full size beds, dressers and bookcases.

Currently the organization is run by all volunteers but it still costs about \$3,000 to pay operating expenses such as rent on the warehouse etc. The goal is to raise enough funds to pay an administrative staff which would cost about \$1,500 per month.
