When I was younger, I remember people from my parent's generation talking about how they remembered exactly where they were and what they were doing when they learned that President Kennedy had been shot. I remembered wondering if there would ever be an event in my life so major that it would be permanently etched in my memory such as that. Unfortunately, the attacks on September 11, 2001 is that event for our generation. I remember being in my dorm room in college getting ready for class when my mom called and told me to turn on the news. I watched as the second plane crashed into the World Trade Center and as the

buildings crumbled later that day. The entire nation was in mourning. This year, on the 10th anniversary of the attacks, I still remember the shock and fear that I felt that day, but now in retrospect, have realized something else. We mourned together. We were afraid together. Our nation, with its diverse cultures, ethnicities, religious and political views was united together. Today, with the turmoil in Washington, constant bickering between political parties, and never ending suffering and conflict captured on the 24-hour news channels, we as a Nation have a challenge: to remain optimistic. What I realized right after the 9-11 attacks was we were shocked, we were disheartened, but we never gave up. We never stopped looking to the future. We never gave up the belief that the world was an inherently good place and worth fighting for. We never stopped being Americans. We didn't let the attacks change who we are. As e.e. cummings once said, "To be nobody but yourself in a world which is doing its best, night and day, to make you everybody else means to fight the hardest battle which any human being can fight; and never stop fighting." The secret, is to keep up the fight even when, like today, the enemy is not so apparent.

USS Arlington was our speaker on Friday. The USS Arlington is one of 3 ships being built to commemorate the 9/11 attacks. The Arlington is the county in Virginia where the Pentagon is located, the USS New York for the attacks in NY City and the USS Somerset which represents the county in Pennsylvania where the plane went down.

PROGRAM

Cmdr Nelson stressed that America needs a strong Navy. Since 80% of the earth is covered with ocean, 80% of the

earth's population lives near the ocean and 90% of the world's trade travels by sea it is important to keep the seas safe. Piracy operations are a big problem in the area of the Suez Canal where 50% of the worlds traffic travels. Since Cmdr Nelson is from Rushville Nebraska his assessment was that the Navy represents the Black Shirts of national defense. 40% of the fleet is underway at any one time which means they can get anywhere in the world in a very short time. In fact 50% of the air strikes in conflicts around the world come from navy carriers.

The USS Arlington is 88% complete and is 684 ft long and 105 ft wide. It is an amphibious transport ship which can carry 700 marines in addition to the 385 crew members. It carries large landing crafts that float on 3 ft of air which allows



them to unload troops and equipment in

places where most craft cannot go. Each landing craft can carry one M1A1 tank or 10 HumVees or 300 Marines.

The Navy's amphibious force is one of the most flexible forces in existence. It can modify what it carries to fit the need. Usually 3 ships travel together and can carry 2,000 marines with aircraft and tanks. The communications on the ship are state of the

art and the ship runs on electronics. The amphibious forces deploy now more than any other type as there is more demand for them for such missions as disaster relief and humanitarian assistance, evacuations etc. For example after the Haiti earthquakes, the ports were destroyed so the amphibious force with the landing craft were used to deliver aid.

The amphibious forces have excellent medical staff with a doctor on board and surgery rooms with surgical teams. The USS Arlington will have a crew of 375 and 50% of the officers will be women. The ship uses "underway replenishment" which means that they re supply while the ship is traveling. They fuel every week and replenish food etc, every 2-3 weeks. They can also be used to haul Army and Air Force troops and supplies if called on.
