Our primary speaker was Robert Latimer, Land Manager TransCanada. He was joined by Mark Johnson, Projects Team member who focuses on addressing nonlandowner audiences.

Robert started by thanking Rotary for the work that we do. He has a niece who was a recent Youth Exchange Student.

The head office of TransCanada is in Calgary, Alberta,

Canada but they have a large footprint in the United States. They have had a Nebraska presence since the early 1980 when they took over ownership of the Northern Border Pipeline.

TransCanada has the most significant pipeline network in North America and 40% of all natural gas used goes through their pipelines.

They are involved in other aspects of power with 21 different power plants including hydro, solar, wind, simple cycle, combined cycle and natural gas-fired cogeneration plants.

Basic description of the proposed Keystone XL pipeline project is:

The Keystone XL Pipeline is a proposed 1,179-mile crude oil pipeline beginning in Hardisty, Alberta in Canada and going through Nebraska to Steele City. Besides transporting crude oil from Canada, the Keystone XL Pipeline will support the growth of crude oil production in the US by providing more access to the large refining markets found in the Midwest and along the Gulf Coast.

To date there has been a total investment of \$15 billion. Once built the pipeline would carry 1.4 million barrels a day.

A primary goal of the presentation was to dispel myths about the proposed Keystone XL pipeline.



Will the pipeline be safe?

They will use satellite technology to monitor operations at 20,000 different points along the pipeline. Trans-Canada has agreed to provide more safety procedures to provide more confidence. Even though the monitoring is done in Canada they are required to adhere to the US standards.

We may not even know that there is a pipeline near us. In Lancaster County there are 7 various pipeline Net-

works. Some carry natural gas, gasoline and some even hazardous products. They may be in our backyard – but they are a silent, safe means of transporting product

What are the economic benefits to the US? There will be 9,000 construction jobs created. When asked whether those jobs are permanent we were told that many are temporary - that is the nature of construction projects.

Someone also pointed out that it was recently reported in the Lincoln Journal Star that the jobs created will only be about 1/3 of what TransCanada has reported. The presenters responded that the actual number is admittedly difficult to project.

They stated that some of the crew would indeed move in for the project, again that is the nature of these types of construction projects -a very mobile workforce.

It is anticipated that there will be tax revenues to 27 counties along the pipeline route.

We have heard that the oil will be exported to China.

Oil will be transported to the Gulf Coast – not to be exported but to go to refineries. Currently we are importing crude oil to the Gulf Coast from Venezuela and the Middle East. The crude from Canada and also North Dakota will be less expensive and will benefit North America.

The Keystone XL pipeline will be bad for the environment There have been five different impact studies and all have had reported that there will not be a significant negative impact on the environment.

When asked why they did not build the pipeline right next to the one that already exists, they responded:

The rights of way to use the land may not extend far enough so they would still need to disturb people and land

The current rout is shorter - more "as the crow flies" than the current pipeline

There is a plan to route through the Bakken area of North Dakota; there is not currently an economical way to pick up that oil and this pipeline would provide that support.

What if the Supreme Court decision does not end up in their favor? They will try another approach and keep moving forward.
