Judy Krasomil 434-3909 udy.krasomil@nifa.org Nicki Klein presented the program on World Polio Day. It is being celebrated on October 24, 2010. She considers the polio eradication program a global success.

The timeline for polio:

1916 New York epidemic

1954 Dr.Jonas Salk invented the polio vaccine

1961 Dr. Albert Sabin improved the polio vaccine

1985 Rotary began the private sector

support for polio eradication. At that time \$120 million was pledged to begin the program.

2009 The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation pledged 355 million dollars toward eradication if Rotary would match 200 million dollars. The deadline for the match is the year 2012. To date 147 million dollars has been raised.

Ms. Klein stated that in 1985 there were 350,000 polio cases in 125 countries on five continents. That accounted for about 1000 children per day.

Today the endemic countries are Afghanistan, Nigeria, India and Pakistan. By 1994 the Western Hemisphere was polio free.

In 2010 there have been 732 new cases reported of polio while in 2009 there were 1198 cases reported. While it is great that cases are down overall, and it is great

that there is such a reduction in the cases in endemic countries, the huge increase in cases in non-endemic countries is bothersome. That just proves that Polio is just a plane-ride-away. People travel more and

more - and diseases spread more easily. "Until Polio is Eradicated Everywhere - it isn't eradicated ANYWHERE".

Rotary sent volunteers to India in 2002. In 2004 Ms. Klein went to India to dispense the polio vaccine on behalf of Rotary for National Immunization Day. The

challenge was to educate people in India about the importance of getting their children vaccinated.

According to Ms. Klein, shopping in India is difficult and usually the only available shopping is street vendors and markets. Electricity is unreliable. There is limited running water and sewage is in open canals.

The people in India hold Americans in the highest regard. Rotary projects are very important in India. She stated that most people want their children immunized. Sometimes the volunteers had to go door to door when there was no transportation for families to get children to the clinic. Often there was a literacy problem. Some did not trust the vaccine.

In closing Nicki quoted Bill Gates- "We have the vaccines to wipe out polio. We have the will to deploy all of the tools at our disposal. If we all have the fortitude to see this effort through to the end we WILL eradicate polio."
