PROGRAM

Joe Roberts, Rotary Foundation Chair, reminded the group that November is Foundation Month. Programs for November will feature Rotary Foundation information, the telling and illustrating.

Joe introduced Gretchen Bren, who is the District 5650 Polio Chairwoman. She is the Executive Secretary for Downtown Omaha Rotary Club. She has been Executive Director since 2007. Her husband, Gary Bren, also a Rotarian, got her involved. She is a Paul Harris fellow and a facilitator for the Rotary Leadership Institute. Her training is in computers and web design. She is a Microsoft Certified Specialist.



The program centered on the Polio Plus Update and How far we've come! Gretchen stated that getting involved in Rotary and the polio projected started her path. She cannot believe that she will see the eradication of Polio in her lifetime.

The facts: There were 125 endemic countries crippled by polio. This started Rotary to plan the most ambitious project ever undertaken by a private entity.

Since 1985, over 2 billion children have been immunized. In 1988 there were 350,000 cases of polio a year. In 2011 there were 502 cases of polio. In 2006 the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation awarded Rotary \$100 million and was increased to \$350 million. Rotary's commitment is to raise \$200 million by June 30, 2012. In 2011, Rotary announced the new public campaign called "This Close" to ending polio. In 2012, India is taken off the polio endemic list.

Wild polio strains can move into other countries. Recently there were 450 in Tajikistan. There were 1349 cases in Congo and China. Importation problems in 2011 included sixteen countries. The World Health Organization and Center for Disease Control now have new policies to get outbreaks sooner.

Gretchen reminded the group that

once you have contracted polio it is for life. So it is important to get all children vaccinated against this deadly disease.

So to follow the money, Gretchen

stated that 20% comes from private funding such as Rotary International and the Gates Foundation. Fourteen per cent come from the G8 Countries and 23% come from the domestic resources of the countries that still have polio cases. There is a funding gap at this time. The shortage is \$945 million.

She stated that Rotary does not spend money on research. Rotary is only into operations, support and controls. They are for surveillance and coverage of

the program basically. There are polio eradication targets and Rotary's goal is 2014. However, the milestones have not been met yet but are in reach.

A national Immunization Day is all year long in the countries affected by polio. She states that it is neat to see the efforts of the local people. And for them to know that the rest of the world cares. Rotary provides signs for the location that will help and encourage families to get the children vaccinated.

A Cold Chain is when the vaccine must be cold to work. It there is warm vaccine it dies. There is temperature sensitive square on the package so that volunteers know that a vaccine is no longer viable. Coolers and ice packs are used to keep a vaccine cold.

Gretchen is often asked why she continues to go back again. Her answer is always "Polio is a way of being involved."

She likes to work in the schools. Volunteers can serve 435 students per day. Often other medicines are given along with the vaccine such as Vitamin A or worming medications. These provide a healthier absorption of the polio vaccine.

She does what she does because "one person can make a difference." Many families are against immunizations probably because of fear and distrust. Children need 6-12 vaccinations during their childhood. Every child under five is vaccinated if possible. There is an 80-90 per cent effectiveness rate for the vaccine.

MEMBERSHIP MINUTE- BERNIE POPPE

Bernie Poppe is currently retired. He did work 32 years at Farmland Industries. His family moved seven or eight times. They finally wound up in Kansas City. He is originally from Chester, Nebraska where the town claim to fame is the founding of six man football. It was originated by Dr. Stephen Epler in 1934. Although he has been to many interesting places, his favorite is the boundary waters area in Minnesota because you get away from the pressures of the world. While living in Mankato, his neighbors asked him to join Rotary. It was a large group of 200-300 members. He moved to Overland Park, Kansas to own a Flowerama with his wife, Roberta. He was asked to help with a Rotary Club start up in Shawnee Mission, Kansas which was a smaller group much like the size of Lincoln South. He felt that was the best experience and figured out what Rotary was all about. He stated that "it is something bigger than yourself." He married his blind date in college and they celebrate their 51 year



anniversary on December 31, 2012. Congratulations Bernie and Roberta!
