

# November Birthdays Carl Zeutzius Bryan Block

#### **PROGRAM**

Joe Roberts introduced Jim Griesen, the District Governor Elect. His topic was Future Vision. Jim has been a member

of Rotary International since 1978. He is currently a member of Club #14. He has served three terms on the Board of Directors of Club 14 and was President in 2007-08.

Jim is an Ohio native and former Michigan resident. He moved

to Nebraska to accept the position of Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University of Nebraska Medical Center. In 1984 he began working at UNL, first in Academic Affairs and then Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs for 20 years. He is currently serving as a Professor in the UNL Department of Educational Administration. Jim and his wife, Margaret, are both Paul Harris Fellows and members of the Bequest Society.

The Rotary Foundation Future Vision Pilot is a three year test of the new grant structure offered in the Foundation's Future Vision Plan. One hundred districts are participating in the pilot. Pilot districts will have a unique opportunity to help refine the new grant structure by provided input and receiving specialized Foundation support and service

The areas of focus include:

Peace and conflict resolution
Disease prevention and treatment
Water and sanitation
Maternal and child health
Basic education and literacy
Economic and community development

Jim stated that the grant process will be more streamlined, interactive and online. It will implement the memorandum of understanding. It was available October 1, 2012. All qualifying clubs may participate.


There are three areas of grants: District, Global and Packaged grants. The District grants are geared toward local or international activities. They should be

educational or humanitarian. The global grants are long term and larger amounts of money. They must be sustainable with measurable outcomes. They must be aligned with the areas of focus to have a world fund match.

Packaged Global Grants provide an opportunity for Rotary clubs in pilot districts to work with strategic partners on predesigned projects and activities funded by the World Fund. This type of grant can support the areas of focus and may include scholarships, humanitarian projects and vocational training.

This is a new type of grant and the Foundation is starting with just of few and will increase the portfolio of opportunities as time goes on.

The District will emphasize multi-club participation in all grant applications. District 5650 will require clubs to have at least two members participate in the Grants Management Seminar prior to applying for District Grants. Mentors will be assigned to each club's grant application
