

PROGRAM

Our guest speaker for the day was

Kate Huebner who was a Youth Exchange Student to Sweden. Kate spoke to the club about an organization that she is involve in called Student volunteers & Optometric Services to Humanity (SVOSH).

SVOSH was started in 1975 by the Southern College of Optometry in

Memphis where she is currently a student. SVOSH members travel to Central and South America to provide free eye care services. To date SVOSH has helped 190,000 patients in 14 countries. The group is sponsored by the Lyons clubs which is the largest donor of glasses in the US. The group makes one trip per year. They stay with host families while they are there but each student is required to raise \$1,000 during the year to pay for their trip. Each student is also required to work 30 hours in the lab packaging glasses for the trip.



There are normally 10-12 students and one doctor per group and 70-80 people go each year. They set up a clinic and many times perform exams outside. They usually see about 300 patients per site. They do visual acuity tests, retinoscopies and check the health of the eye. 60% of the patients they see have disease of the eye and 10% is sight threatening. Damage from sun exposure is the largest problem

they see since many of the countries are close to the equator. Also many of the patients do close craft work and it is exciting to watch them able to see well for the first time.


