We've grown into an amazing global network of 1.4 million interconnected community leaders - leaders who share a deep commitment to doing good in the world. But what makes Rotary powerful isn't just what we do for the communities we serve. We also support and empower each other, by creating a safe space for our members to bring their whole, authentic selves. We show each other comfort and care.

These connections are deeply meaningful. The U.S. surgeon general recently declared loneliness a public health epidemic. Dr. Vivek Murthy said, "We must prioritize building social connection the same way we have prioritized other critical public health issues such as tobacco, obesity, and substance use disorders." I am proud of what Rotary has done across generations to build those kinds of social connections — and this magazine focused on loneliness and what Rotary can do about it in its January 2023 issue.

Our worldwide community and our foundational value prioritizing Service Above Self makes Rotary a powerful global advocate for mental health. A recently published study by Ohio State University found performing acts of kindness was the only one of three mental health interventions tested that helped people feel more connected to others. Study co-author David Cregg said, "Performing acts of kindness seems to be one of the best ways to promote those connections."

This research suggests what we've known all along — that doing good helps transform not just the communities we serve, but it also transforms us. As we put a greater focus on mental health, let's not think of this effort as something new to Rotary, but rather as something we can do better and as a result have a greater impact on ourselves and the people we serve.

We are not starting this effort from scratch. The Rotary Action Group on Mental Health Initiatives has been focused on these kinds of issues for several years — and we will be looking to members of that group for leadership as we continue to build awareness.

Mental health care fits comfortably within several of our areas of focus. As of May, there are 41 global grant-supported projects with a mental health focus. Many of them have tremendous promise, and we will be highlighting them in the months ahead.

So let's work together to erase the stigma associated with emotional well-being, raise awareness of mental health needs, and improve access to preventive and interventional mental health services.

Together, we will Create Hope in the World.

n today's dynamic environment, maintaining a strong and thriving club like the Rotary Club of Kiwatule is very important and needs extra and dynamic strategies. The success of any club depends on its ability to attract new members, retain existing ones, and keep them actively engaged. This month's theme is Membership & New Club Development and so together we will explore effective strategies to achieve these objectives and maintain a vibrant and strong club.

But first, let us understand the theory of Attraction, Retention, and Engagement in our club.

Attraction: The first step in maintaining a thriving club is attracting new members. Attraction can be achieved through impactful service, outreach efforts, word-of-mouth referrals, and a clear value proposition, highlighting the benefits of joining the club, such as networking opportunities, access to resources, or a sense of belonging.

Retention: Once you have attracted members, retaining them becomes crucial. High member retention is indicative of a strong and healthy club. To retain members, focus on providing consistent value, exceptional experiences, and addressing their needs and expectations. Implementing feedback mechanisms through effective communication to understand members' preferences and pain points, and adapt your engagements accordingly.

Engagement: An engaged club is an active and impactful one. Engagement fosters a sense of loyalty and encourages members to actively participate and contribute to the club activities and projects and hence the sum total performance of the club. This can be achieved through regular effective communication, interactive events, gamification, and recognition of member achievements. An engaged club will thrive and attract even more members over time.

How then can the Rotary Club of Kiwatule achieve the above? Let us delve into the strategies that can be employed to attract, retain and engage our members effectively. Our initiatives are going to be based on the Buddy Group System.



1. Creating a Welcoming and Inclusive Environment

Welcoming may not be limited to new members, but also the current members at every event either physical or online. Making everyone feel they are part of that particular meeting or part of RCK. For example, feeling welcome in a buddy group, and the buddy group welcoming members for fellowship when they are in charge. Being inclusively welcoming without segregation by age or ethnicity.

2. Offering Valuable and Relevant Activities

RCK can be creative in engaging members by providing them with valuable and relevant activities. For example, having a variety of fellowships with formats that can are engaging, either through discussion or activity. Allocating activities to all buddy group members when in charge, engaging members through their vocations.

3. Recognizing and Rewarding Member Contributions

This is very key as members easily lose interest when not recognized. I have met a number of Rotarians



who leave Rotary, when they feel their value is not recognized. Recognizing and rewarding members for their contributions reinforces their sense of belonging and motivates others to actively participate in club activities. Implement a recognition system that acknowledges achievements, for example through your buddy groups, do you recognize or reward the person with the most ambassadorial visits.

4. Cultivating Strong Leadership at all Levels

A club thrives when it has strong leadership and effective moderation at both club and buddy group levels. We need to empower our leaders at all levels as this contributes to leadership development, if we allow the buddy group leader to fully work with his/her team to run fellowship, and let it be known that its members need to respect and cooperate with their leader at that level, or allow a committee develop a program through its leadership and deliver on behalf of the whole club, then this can only add to

the basket of leaders who can later lead the whole club.

In conclusion, as RCK, we are not leaving anyone behind, engage and engage, but this requires consistent effort, dedication, and a genuine commitment to the well-being of its members. By focusing on attraction, retention, and engagement, and by fostering a welcoming and inclusive environment, our club can flourish and make a meaningful impact on the communities in which we serve. Let's decentralize this effort at the Buddy Group level, each buddy group should attract, retain and engage its members. Remember that a successful club is not only about numbers but about creating a space where members feel connected, supported, and inspired to grow together and serve their communities.

MUBENDE "SUNDA" WATER PROJECT":

Providing Sustainable Safe Water in Mubende and Kassanda Districts, Uganda, the "Rotary Grant."

Background:

The project, estimated at \$52, 000 USD, seeks to provide access to reliable water supply leveraging paid water services through a metered unit. This technology provides for collection of dues to access the water at boreholes and ensuring that there is timely support when the boreholes are broken. It also targets to repair at least 25 boreholes and installation of a sunda unit in water stressed The boreholes that areas. are targeted for intervention serve between 100 and 200 households per day. This is a reach of 500 to 1000 people per day that are serviced through this project.

The project is being implemented through a



partnership with RC Osaka-Semba (Japan) who have mobilised \$25, 000 USD, RC Najjeera contributing \$2,000 while RC Kiwatule will provide \$5,000 USD. The rest of the financing will be obtained through a global grant application by RC Kiwatule. MoWE is providing technical support to the project through the Mubende Rural Water Service Centre.

Mission to Mubende and Kassanda DLGs on 21st July 2023

1. Mission objective:

To meet and introduce the proposed project to top district leadership and signing of MoUs.

2. Mission Team

RC Kiwatule (Ronald Sekitoleko, Denis Asiimwe); RC Najjera (Andrew Serunjogi); Ministry of Water & Environment - MOWE (Paul Busoborwa); Sunda Technologies Uganda (Ayo)

3. Mission Results

(a) Mubende DLG

- Team met the Chief Administrative Officer - CAO and District Water Officer -DWO. The Local Council - LC V Chairman was not at station.
- CAO received the project positively and guided that the project targets water stressed parts of the District. He encouraged the team to consider community sensitisation as critical for project acceptance by the communities.
- CAO (a Rotarian) advised that the project partnership be expanded to involve resident Rotary Clubs, namely Mubende and Mubende-Metro.
- CAO advised that the team returns to the district to brief the LCV chairman to obtain his buy-in and subsequent sign off of the MOU.

(b) Kassanda DLGs

- Team met LCV Chairman, Deputy LCV Chairman, Secretary production, CAO(Rotarian), Deputy CAO, DWO, and Clerk to Council.
- The project was well received, and the chairman offered to be the project champion in the district.

- The Chairman guided that the project needed to take into consideration equitable access to all segments of the community.
- Chairman requested for additional time to internalise MOU which would be subsequently signed next week.

4. Next steps

- (a) The Team will return to both DLGs on Tuesday with a view to concluding the MoU signing (with slight amendments to accommodate LCV Chairman) and final list of project sites for implementation.
- (b) Budget to be reviewed for finalisation on Monday by Denis, Paul, and Ayo.
- (c) President Alex M. B. Twesigye encouraged to engage his colleagues in Mubende to join in the partnership. It will ease our work on ground as some of them are senior technical officers in the DLG

Book Review Corner



Here's a brief overview of the 6 critical ingredients used by companies who successfully transit from "good" to "great".

1. Level 5 Leadership

At the time of their big transition, all the good-to-great companies had Level 5 leadership. These exhibit the duality of personal humility and professional will.

2. First Who, Then What

Instead of setting a grand vision and strategy, then rallying people behind them, good-to-great companies got the right people on-board, then figured out which direction to take.

3. Confront the Brutal Facts (Yet Never Lose Faith)

Good-to-great companies don't just pursue a vision – they constantly refine their paths with brutal facts ood To Great examines what it takes for ordinary companies to become great and outperform their competitors by analyzing a number of companies over 30 years, who managed to make the transition or fell prey to their bad habits.

To identify "great" companies, Collin and his research team started with 1,435 good companies, examined their performance over 40 years, and identified 11 companies that became great, namely Abbott, Circuit City, Fannie Mae, Gillette, Kimberly-Clark, Kroger, Nucor, Philip Morris, Pitney Bowes, Walgreens, Wells Fargo.

4. The Hedgehog Concept

They apply a simple but insightful frame of reference (the Hedgehog Concept) for all their decisions.

This idea is built on the concept of the Greek Parable, The Hedgehog and the Fox. The fox pursues many ends, sees the world as complex, and is scattered/ diffused. The hedgehog, conversely, simplifies the world into a single idea or principle that guides everything it does. The Hedgehog Concept lies at the intersection of the 3 circles:

- What you can be the best in the world at;
- What drives your economic engine; and
- What are you deeply passionate about.

5. A Culture of Discipline

Most successful start-ups don't grow into great companies. As they grow, they start to introduce bureaucracy and rules to make up for incompetence and lack of discipline. To avoid bureaucracy, hierarchy, and excessive controls, instill a culture of discipline (through disciplined people, thought and action). Combine the culture of discipline with an ethic of entrepreneurship to get superior performance.



6. Technology Accelerators

Good-to-great companies think differently about technology. Specifically, good-to-great companies:

- Think of technology as accelerators, not creators, of momentum;
- Avoid the Technology Trap; and
- Adopt new technology due to their desire for excellence & creation, not fear.

The key takeaway from Good to Great is discipline. To go from a good organization to a great one you need disciplined people, disciplined thought, and disciplined action.

- Disciplined people: means getting the right people and keeping them focused on excellence.
- Disciplined thought: means being honest about the facts and avoid getting side-tracked.
- Disciplined action: means understanding what is important to achieve and what isn't.
