

he 2022 Rotary 5 Aside was held on the backdrop of the COVID 19 pandemic. There were mixed reviews leading up to this event. The pessimists imagining the public were not ready for a sports event while the everoptimistic members of Rotary Club of Kiwatule, who were clearly the majority, saw it as a huge opportunity to bring together the rotary fraternity after 2 years of "social distancing".

With no Horn in hand and remember we don't even know how to blow one, the event was dubbed by many as one of the most exciting Rotary 5 aside

events. There are quite many a thing that made the sixth edition of the Rotary 5 Aside event a success.

Essentially the optimists got it bang on. We had an overwhelming number of Rotary and Rotaract Clubs expressing interest for the tournament. Considering that the total number of participating clubs Rotary (32 teams) and Rotaract (16 teams) were met with four weeks leading to the event, we faced an unenviable task of declining new club registrations for the event.

Our corporate partners responded to our call, raising over Uganda shillings 75 million towards the event. With the leadership of DSTV our Title sponsor we had additional support from FINCA Uganda Limited (MDI), UGAFODE Microfinance Limited, Centenary Bank Uganda Limited, Britam Asset Managers (Uganda) Limited, NCBA, Pride Microfinance Limited, CIC Insurance, New Vision, Bukedde, UAP Old Mutual and Health Heart Foundation. We were proud to have DSTV as title sponsors of the 6th edition, the event dovetailed with DSTV's corporate social responsibility goal of supporting needy communities. With their support we had a total of Uganda shillings thirty million distributed to the event winners, these funds were paid out to the winning teams and utilized towards service projects in the course the year.

No event is complete without fans. The Phillip Omondi Stadium hosted over 1,500 guests on the day and over 300 cars were safely parked with no loss incidence reported at Patidar Samaj Lugogo grounds. While the games went on in the pitch one couldn't help but notice that there was a clear show of brand prowess from the Rotary fraternity. Most clubs came dressed in well branded uniforms not only for the players but their fans too, some clubs were armed with Drums and vuvuzelas, but

most notably there was a group that had popular dance hall music blaring from a portable boom box bringing a party atmosphere to the event, perhaps Rotary Club of Kiwatule should consider recognizing the best dressed and organized supporting team. The Nyama Choma and drinks corner were highlights of the years' event not only were the food and drinks in plenty but choice as well. If it weren't for the stadium closing hours we could have witnessed an after event day party.

No event however goes without glitches, while these were few the capable support network at the event ensured the event went on without notice. We cannot thank our Chief Guest, the District Governor, Mike Kennedy Sebalu, enough for being patient when the event couldn't start as planned due to our back up power failure, our VIP stand on the other hand was only open to the spectators at 12 noon nevertheless when it was up it hosted some of the most exciting spectator experiences.

We partnered with Health Heart Foundation who provided on field medical first aid and health advisory with a dedicated team of doctors, nurses and an ambulance. HHF's support was truly appreciated. The 5 aside event day is a result of four months articulate planning by the Rotary Club of Kiwatule. The 2022 event was truly delivered by some dedicated members of the club under the leadership of its president Ms. Marion Natukunda who not only supported the preparations but was boots on ground during the event from start to finish.

We thank all the partners who made this event a success and the activities for the 2023 event are already underway with a promise to deliver the best ever 5 Aside tournament impacting even more communities and creating hope.





whenever required.


It is unethical to share confidential data with external parties and any other individual who is not related to the organization. Data in any form must not be passed to anyone outside the organization.


Park your car at the space allocated to you. Don't park your vehicle at the entrance as it might obstruct someone's way.


