




MEETING – 16TH AUGUST 2022

President Vera highlighted a few matters including:

Regionalisation Project

By now you would have heard about Regionalisation via the several articles in RDU, social media or websites. Things have changed as the preparation has progressed and previously held opinions may be inaccurate, so ensure you are up to date by finding out more.

There are ample opportunities to learn more about Regionalisation. Learn the facts from fellow Rotarians in your district with a club visit, attend a webinar or via a recorded presentation link.

The basic information is that RI has approved Rotary Zone 8 (Australia, NZ and pacific Islands) to engage in a regional program to explore opportunities for Rotary in the future.

The Regionalisation pilot is a proposal to explore new ways of doing things in Rotary with the aim of reducing duplication and saving money. It seeks the opportunity to try a few things over the next few years and assess how these work- good or bad. This vote is to explore some options and help create the Rotary of the future.

In a few years after the pilot is completed there will be an opportunity to vote again on the positive changes to become permanent. This vote is to give things a go and explore some options. Take control of your Rotary future.

The timeline is related to a vote by each club in September where Presidents will be making the vote on behalf of your club to proceed with the Regionalisation pilot. It is important to understand what is being planned so your club can make an informed decision.

- Every club vote will be counted.
- Not voting will count as a No vote- so it's important to vote.
- The pilot will only progress with a positive vote by more than two-thirds of clubs



PURPOSE

International Service encompasses efforts to expand Rotary's humanitarian reach around the world; through Rotary's avenues of services and aligning with the Rotary Foundations areas of focus, the clubs in our district are supported to research, design, implement and review projects globally. This is what our club has been doing for many years in helping those less fortunate overseas

This year's committee comprises myself as chair, Richard Lawrence, Peter Condos Fong Loong, Nola Spicer, Tim Anderson, Peter Haleseh, and with special support and guest appearance from Shirley Kukk

Financials

We have some \$200,000 for Myanmar and \$25,000 for Ethiopia in investment accounts with Bendigo Bank Balanced Fund (Sandridge Trustees).

There is also some \$15,500 with RAWCS that needs to be spent on education in Myanmar and a further \$400 in RAWCS to be spent on medical equipment/supplies.

So we are committed to projects in Myanmar, Philippines and Ethiopia.





UPDATE ON MYANMAR

Richard Lawrence has been the mover and shaker in connecting with Myanmar and has been over and led delegations and we thank him for his continuing commitment.



Children's Home

Road into the property completed allows 12-month access which previously was not possible during the wet season.

Since December of last year, they have been able to construct some dormitory type buildings at the farm and this has allowed them to move from their previous rented building to the farm which they own themselves and removed the burden of rent.

They now have 34 children in care and they are able to grow their own vegetables and fruits (bananas and pineapples etc...) and this all reduces the costs on the organisation immensely. This was always the plan for the resulting building the wet season road into the farm.







They have plans for a fishpond to grow fish to eat also. Richard Lawrence on his next visit to Myanmar will see how things are progressing and what other projects we can potentially look at.

Step-In-Step-Up Group

This organisation operates in Yangon in the poorer "ghetto" parts of the suburban areas over the river. There is a great need to protect children from "people smugglers" who prey on the poorer families and who ultimately use the children for human organ selling into India and China where they can make massive amounts of money.



The organisation which is organised by a South African lady named Jackie Appel has grown enormously during Covid and have now taken over a local school for their vocational training programs. The training includes:

- Hospitality and Banqueting training
- Sewing and clothes making
- Trainee Chefs
- Health Care Aid workers
- Agriculture/ Horticulture 101 training
- First Aid Training
- Baby and Childcare workers
- Office and administration training
- Financial literacy
- Retail worker training
- Travel and Tourism training

Being based in a ghetto area the organisation aims at training the local community in village clean up, hygiene, emergency relief and local sanitation improvements.





The training education programs are short and specific and the whole idea is to get young people into work and earning money in attempt to help their families as well avoid the clutches of the people smugglers. RCE International Committee has supported this group in a very small way on our last visit to Myanmar in 2020, donating \$2500.

Yangon General Hospital - Anaesthesia Dept

RCE has supplied on two previous years Blood Oxygen Testers or Life box Pulse Oximeters as they call them to the Yangon General Hospital – Anaesthesia Department. Last visit in 2020 we donated 200 of these small but vital machines which are used all over Myanmar.

The number we donated seems large, however the need is far greater. They need at least 500 more as they are sharing the current number between about 50 large and small regional hospitals throughout Myanmar. The last two times we supplied the Oximeters Richard and co "muled" the machines into Myanmar in their luggage so as to get them through the Myanmar Customs system in a quick and timely manner. 200 Oximeters supplied last time would save over 5000 lives! For only cost around USD \$50 each.

NEXT STEPS

The IC through Richard will put forward a proposal to the RCE board for a Royce and jean Abbey scholarship grant of US \$10,000 to help pay for training in addition funding for 500 oxygen testers and egg machines. We will also consider the use of the outstanding RAWCS funds.

ROTARY CLUB OF BALWYN CENTENARY GRANTS

Proceeds from Camberwell Market

Joint project with RC of Leeton Central to assist Bahay Tuluyan a children's rights organization in the Philippines.

Grant request \$50,000.

A big thank you to Shirley for developing and preparing the proposal and application

The project will refurbish and equip an existing house to become a place for healing and recovery for children in need of special protection, 'Tala Camp and Eco-Retreat'. Bahay Tuluyan, a children's rights organization in the Philippines, works with children who have experienced abuse, violence, and neglect. It aims to help these children and their families to recover from their experiences so they can live happy, healthy lives. Each year at least 500 children and youth access Bahay Tuluyan's various services.

Bahay Tuluyan has been gifted a house on a 1-hectare property for its work with children and young people. Bahay Tuluyan's dream is to turn the property into a camp and eco-retreat where children and families can





undergo healing and therapeutic activities. However, in order to be safe and appropriate for use the house needs to be refurbished and repaired.

Induction for new members

It was suggested that a mentor panel of experienced Club members (3-4) be formed who could mentor new members, particularly as the current system does not appear to be working too well.

This mentor panel to hold induction sessions twice a year which new members are invited to, but also be available to new members at other times, as required.

Excellence in Service Awards

Irene stated that this may be a good marketing / PR tool for the Club but noted that the MV Council and others are doing similar awards.

Although the Committee noted the potential value of this project, it was decided not to pursue these awards this year. The main reason being that the timing for businesses at present is not good with staff shortages, Covid impacts etc.





Joe Bradbury Award

In lieu of the Excellence in Service Awards, the Committee preferred to sponsor a school student to fund year 12, and 3 years post-secondary. Project previously implemented by the Club and known as the "Joe Bradbury Award".

\$1,000 per year to the successful student to go towards study or vocational pathway reimbursement of fees.

- Rosehill College
- Strathmore College
- Buckley Park College

Michael Mahoney committed to funding this project for the next 12 months.


