

Our club meeting this week focused on a matter close to many current and past members hearts.

The property known as 2 Grice Cres. Essendon has the old Royal District Nursing Services building on it. The building was erected, maintained and extended due to the hard work and funds raised by many Essendon Rotarians over the years. The District Nurses served the community there for over 60 yrs until the service was sold and merged to the Bolton Clarke company. The site has since been left derelict and despite many efforts by current and past members of our club we have not been able to secure the site to again make it a focal point of serving the needy in our community.

One of our guests this week was Past President of the Rotary Club of Essendon, Alan Murphy. Alan explained how the site was deemed to be suitable for Caroline Chisholm (remember her? I told you a lot about her works in the last edition of Contact) to establish the first of ten sites along the road from Melbourne to the goldfields in the 1850's to cater for women and children travelling the hard roads to be safe to sleep and to have a meal at a reasonable cost. Alan explained the integral part our Rotary Club played in funding the site in the mid 1950's to become the RDNS base for our area. The site was chosen largely in part because of the history of the Caroline Chisholm connection and the suitability of continuing Caroline's community work. That is all now at risk as the government of Victoria have deemed it a site to be sold off for development. Members of the recently formed Friends of Caroline Chisholm group were also in attendance providing members with valuable information to assist us in understanding the need to not only retain the site as one of historical significance but also to reinvigorate it in to a place once again able to provide services to women and children in need, just as Caroline did.

<u>Did you know...</u> 10 October is World Mental Health Day

The overall objective of World Mental Health Day is to raise awareness of mental health issues around the world and to mobilize efforts in support of mental health.

The Day provides an opportunity for all stakeholders working on mental health issues to talk about their work, and what more needs to be done to make mental health care a reality for people worldwide.

You probably know more people who have dealt with mental ill health than you realise. People are still a bit hesitant to speak about their challenges in keeping good mental health. There are many reasons for that. Some are not ready to speak. Some are worried they may be discriminated against. But this day is set aside for the many who care about people's mental health to discuss this big issue. Good mental health is an integral part of our overall health and wellbeing. Access to appropriate quality mental health care should be a universal human right but not everybody knows where to go or even has access to care when they need it. International project in Sri Lanka providing reconstructive surgery to infants with cleft lip congenital disorder. The Rotary Club of Battaramulla in Sri Lanka partnered with the Rotary Club of Essendon to fund the



reconstructive surgery of cleft lips to 108 infants and to date have completed over 100 surgeries.

Cleft lip while not life threatening immediately does result in feeding difficulties in infants, facial disfiguration, impaired speech and ultimately social marginalisation in Sri Lanka. If left untreated infants will not thrive as they cannot feed effectively.

Approximately 550 such births occur annually in Sri Lanka and reconstructive surgery is usually carried out within 3-5 months of birth.





The expertise to treat children is available in the Lady Ridgeway Hospital for Children in Columbo but while receiving around 300 cleft lip and cleft palate patients annually, is able to treat only about 200. The rest either remain untreated or face extremely expensive costs if they can obtain private medical attention.

The objective of the project was to provide reconstructive surgery to cleft lip patients in a manner that will ensure that at least all of the patients visiting the hospital, who are from



economically disadvantaged families and who cannot afford private medical attention will receive corrective surgery. Congratulations to all involved in this wonderful life changing project.

1. That the RCE develops a Royce and Jean Abbey Vocational Scholarship application for a recipient from Ruben Centre, Kenya.

This needs a working party to be established to assist in the extensive process.

Treasurer:

1. That the newly legislated Not-For-Profit return be filed with the ATO by Mead Partners Tax Accountants, with information provided by the Treasurer of RCE, for an annual cost of \$220 incl. GST.

1. That Board approves payment of the increased cost involved in obtaining the outstanding Withholding Tax refund amounting to \$3,700 (already received \$1,067 franking credits), the one-off cost having risen from \$550 to \$880 incl. GST.
