## **Community Report-February 2023**

### Soiree:

The Soiree was held in October 2022. The event was well attended by Rotarians and friends on a challenging day (Rain and Floods). Approximately \$5000 was raised. Alistair Fraser did a brilliant job in leading a committed team to organise the event. It is envisaged \$3000 will go towards supporting Ukrainian people in Victoria displaced by war.

#### Ukrainian People displaced due to War:

Thanks to Christine Hilbert who continues to liaise with Andrea from the Ukrainian Association to identify needs of the Community. Possibility of providing funding for swimming lessons or a program to support Youth experiencing Home-sickness.

#### Youth Projects:

Youth Projects is an organisation based in Hosier Lane Melbourne. Youth Projects supports people of all ages sleeping rough in Melbourne's Central Business District. They provide drop in services, as well as night nurses attending to clients on the street.

Funds have been accessed through a District Matching Grant application. RCE are contributing \$2500 and District Foundation, \$2500, making the total project \$5000. Items have been sourced and purchased to assist people who are street based to have protection from the extremes of heat in our warmer months. Over the next two weeks RCE members will accompany Youth Projects' Night Nurses and assist with distributing the items.

Thanks to Luke Docking for Co-ordinating this project.

#### Scope:

Scope is an organisation supporting people across the state, living withDisabilities. In December Vera, Lisa and Lisa's Grandson visited Scope for morning tea. Clients showcased their musical skills using instruments purchased with funding from RCE. Scope recently moved to new premises and will invite RCE to the official opening. Further projects to be explored.





### Port Melbourne SLSC Members:

Members to attend and observe Nippers program. Explore possibility of water safety lessons for children displaced due to war in Ukraine.

### Windy Hill Aphasia Group:

The group is made up of 12 locals living with Aphasia. Aphasia impacts a person's ability to communicate. It can occur suddenly after a stroke or head injury, or develop slowly from brain disease.

The group is very grateful to RCE for acting as Auspice so the group are able to access funding from Moonee Valley to pay for a speech pathologist to attend social gatherings and help with communication. Rotarians have been invited to attend gatherings.

### **International Committee report and update**

#### **Purpose**

International Service encompasses efforts to expand Rotary's humanitarian reach around the world; through Rotary's avenues of services and aligning with the Rotary Foundations areas of focus, the clubs in our district are supported to research, design, implement and review projects globally. This is what our club has been doing for many years in helping those less fortunate overseas This year's committee comprises myself as chair, Richard Lawrence, Peter Condos, see Fong, Nola Spicer, Tim Anderson, Peter Halaseh, Norm Mollica and with special support from Shirely Kukk and John Odgers reporting on DIK.

#### **Financials**

We have some \$200,000 for Myanmar and \$25,000 for Ethiopia in investment accounts with Bendigo Bank Balanced Fund (Sandridge Trustees).

There is also some \$15,500 with RAWCS that needs to be spent on education in Myanmar and a further \$400 in RAWCS to be spent on medical equipment/supplies. So we are committed to projects in Myanmar, Philippines and Ethiopia.

### **Update On Myanmar**

At the outset I would like to recognise and acknowledge the enormous effort and commitment by Richard Lawrence on behalf of the club in Myanmar. His visits over there and the relationships developed, and assistance provided is to be commended. An example of Richards efforts include:

- Buying them 6 months of rice
- New tyres for their truck
- 40 soccer shirts from DIK





### Children's Home

Road into the property completed allows 12-month access which previously was not possible during the wet season.

Since December of last year, they have been able to construct some dormitory type buildings at the farm and this has allowed them to move from their previous rented building to the farm which they own themselves and removed the burden of rent. They now have 34 children in care and they are able to grow their own vegetables and fruits (bananas and pineapples etc...) as well as cows producing milk and this all reduces the costs on the organisation immensely.

The children have recommenced schooling at the local school which is a 5-minute walk from the farm and they really enjoy the extra space and farm life with the chooks and other animals and the Vege patch etc....

They have completed the fishpond and are producing fish to eat approx. 1,000 fish to Date.

### Step-In Step-Up project -Myanmar

The organization has received the first payment and extremely over moon with our (Rotary's) support i.e. \$33,000 from our Myanmar and RAWCS accounts with board approval. They have added us as a sponsor partner (Rotary and RCE Icon) and they have linked it back to our RCE website. The other thing is they have called the Padauk program the Rotary Padauk project.

In summary: Padauk is aimed at the lost generation aged 15 - 17, for whom there is no longer any possibility of schooling and who are highly susceptible to be trafficked or employment by unscrupulous bosses. The program runs over 2 years and gives them vocational and life skills to enable them to enter the workforce without a school certificate. It is this Program — Padauk Kids the Rotary Club of Essendon partially fund over the next 12 months for 30 participants.

At this point I will run through quickly the SISU programme to give you a greater insight to its benefits.

A subcommittee has been formed by the International Committee to discuss and investigate the possible implementation of an online "Crowd Funding" programme to raise awareness and raise vital funds for the "SCOT project". The SCOT project stands for the Stop Child Organ Theft project. This is a major billion dollar criminal activity where one child is valued at over USD \$150,000. This horrific tragedy affects over 50,000 Myanmar families annually.

Crowd Funding (CF) discussion: The committee discussed the overall set up for the CF. This is to include the following:

- 1. Establish an online presence via a sophisticated web site that has plenty picture content and lots of "Donate" buttons. The committee will require written content for the Website —the Step In Step Up organisation have offered to assist with content, pictures and information that they can supply to help build content on the SCOT website.
- 2. The incorporation of the RAWCS website in the payment of donations will save plenty of dollars as we will be able to link the DONATE button on the website so it goes directly to the RAWCS site for payment.
- 3. Marketing discussion looked at various options:

Social media marketing on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and any other worthwhile social media site. This would incorporate a link back to the website and a small story about the SCOT Total cost for the SCOT project.

Crowd Funding will be \$5,000 in this first twelve months with all seed funds to be used out of the RCE Myanmar Projects account which currently has over \$200,000 with board approval

### Myanmar Oxygen Concentrators

Richard Lawrence received a big thank you from Dr San San Yi for the Oxygen Concentrators that Richard arranged to be sent to Myanmar during COVID-19 on behalf of the Rotary Club of Essendon.

COVID-19 in Myanmar was and still is a major problem for the local citizens who have no vaccines they can use to defend themselves against the virus. The vast majority ended up in a very under resourced Myanmar hospital which could only supply minimal oxygen to help with serious respiratory issues that caused and continue to cause major deaths as a result of having COVID-19 disease.

In late 2020 RCE via the International Committee (with Board support), decided to supply battery backup "Oxygen Concentrators" to four of the main hospitals in Yangon. During 2021 via our great local Myanmar supporter Dr San San Yi, together we supplied these oxygen machines to those thousands of patients who were suffering in these hospitals. In Dr San San Yi's opinion the battery backed up Oxygen Concentrators supplied to the four hospitals by the Rotary Club of Essendon have saved over the past 18 months in excess of 250,000 lives during the Covid 19 pandemic in Myanmar and continue to do so.





#### Rotary Club Of Balwyn Centenary Grants - Bahay Tuluyan Project (Philippines)

Confirming RC Balwyn will make a grant of \$50,000 to the Rotary Club of Essendon and Leeton Central to assist with our Philippines project titled: Project Rainbow – Creating a Place of Healing for Child Survivors of Trauma.

The project will refurbish and equip an existing house to become a place for healing and recovery for children in need of special protection, 'Tala Camp and Eco-Retreat'. Bahay Tuluyan, a children's rights organization in the Philippines, works with children who have experienced abuse, violence, and neglect. It aims to help these children and their families to recover from their experiences so they can live happy, healthy lives.

Each year at least 500 children and youth access Bahay Tuluyan's various services. Bahay Tuluyan has been gifted a house on a 1-hectare property for its work with children and young people. Bahay Tuluyan's dream is to turn the property into a camp and eco-retreat where children and families can undergo healing and therapeutic activities. However, in order to be safe and appropriate for use the house needs to be refurbished and repaired. The refurbishment will repair leaks and add a multipurpose room, 4 bedrooms, 7 toilet/bathrooms, kitchen, dining room, meeting room, office and storage area. It will also repair/refresh 6 existing bedrooms and various other rooms.

The goal will be to create a sustainable, eco-friendly site that can accommodate up to 25 children or youth at a time for programs and activities to help them overcome trauma. It is anticipated that at least 200 people will be able to access and benefit from the property each year.
