President Vera firstly inducted Debra Kingston. Nola Spicer is Debra's mentor, and Debra has been assigned to the Community Committee. Debra's professional designation is dress making. Debra is really looking forward to being part of an amazing body of people, and will do anything she can.

President Vera then inducted Resina Bayer.



Resina is a VET teacher.

Andrew Panjkov is Resina's mentor.

Resina is delighted to be part of good group of people with a passion for service and contribution.

She will do all she can to help in these pursuits.

Ross Butterworth of WERN was then welcomed by President Vera.

Ross has been involved with the Western Emergency Relief Network since its inception.

Ross showed a brief video that outlines WERN's status as a Not For Profit Organisation that acts on behalf of Rotary to provide support for people in crisis. Included among such people are refugees, families suffering from domestic violence, and families in crisis.

WERN is a Rotary Community Service project of Bacchus Marsh, Caroline Springs, East Keilor, Essendon North, Flemington-Kensington, Hoppers Crossing, Melton Valley, Pt. Gellibrand, Werribee, West Footscray, Williamstown, Wyndham and Yarraville Rotary Clubs.

Ross explained that WERN's creation commenced around casual conversations in 2012 and formal discussions 2014. In 2015 WERN became an Incorporated Association, a registered Charity and a Foundation with DGR Registration.

Ross observed that in its first year: WERN partnered with 40 Welfare Agencies & 162 Case workers on the ground assisting 160 families & individuals. WERN provided \$80,000 of goods or 1,800 items. It performed 160 collections and contributed 2200 volunteer hours to the WERN program.

WERN has had several different 'homes' over its life. It relocated in March 2019 due to tunnel works to Derrimut. A Building Fund to finance the purchase of suitable premises was established.

A conversation with the City of Melton commenced in 2019 to explore the viability of partnering with a joint development for purpose-built \$2.5 Million warehouse in Ravenhall – 1,000 sq. metres for a 20 year term at a peppercorn rent.

Ross outlined the two main services that WERN offers.

- WERN provides emergency relief assistance through partner agencies to those in crisis.
- Collects donated 2nd hand goods and acts as a distribution point for our member agencies.
- · These goods are furniture, bedding, white goods and household items

Ross explained that WERN does not in the main deal directly with the public, but only takes clients referred by our partner welfare agencies or member rotary clubs

WERN is like Rotary and many other community service organisations staffed by volunteers.

WERN today is vibrant and well connected service organisation. Ross outlined some Headline facts.

- WERN works with over 60 Support / welfare agency partners & the number is growing;
- Around 390 accredited Case Managers WERN Troops on the ground;
- 13 Member Rotary Clubs and there is room for more;
- To Date: Around 8,000 people assisted; Provided almost \$1,750,000.00 of goods or 80,000

items; 2,700 collections and

• 22,000 volunteer hours have been contributed to the WERN program.

Towards the end of his presentation Ross Butterworth raised the issue of finance with several key fund providers being specified.

- Charitable and Philanthropic Trusts e.g. Lord Mayors Charitable Trust; Freemasons;
- Councils e.g. Melton & Wyndham;
- Welfare Agencies open to all;
- Businesses e.g. CMV have donated a van, Cleanaway, VicTrack
- Member Rotary Clubs have already committed: Keilor, Footscray, Melton & Gisborne have all made specific donations to WERN;
- Consider commencing or supporting an Emergency Relief Network providing both
 Rotarians and community members an opportunity for a hands-on experience helping
 others whilst increasing the Rotary profile in our own communities.

A third possible new emergency service based in Ballarat is also being investigated.

Ross also noted that all clubs and club members are welcome to partake in th3 vocational experience at WERN. WERN is about to start operating on Saturday mornings.

Standing in for our welfare officer Maria Kouppas, Chair Lisa Lowcock happily announced that there were no new illnesses, apart from Maria who is not feeling very well. Norm Mollica is still in Rehabilitation at the Dorset Hospital and Lisa reports that it is a 'waiting game'.

President Vera noted that the 9th Annual Moonee Valley Art Show (East Keilor and Essendon) is running from 19-21 May 2023.

A journey with the Night Nurses of Youth Projects:



Wednesday the 22nd, a balmy evening, 2 Essendon Rotary Club members accompanied Nathan, Peter and nurse co-ordinator Teddy on their regular mission visiting People who are street based in Melbourne's Central Business district. The major purpose was to befriend and offer help if needed with food packs, hats, clothing and sunscreen lotion. The Night Nurses provided information and invited clients to attend their newly renovated premises, The Living Room in Hosier Lane where they could shower, relax in the lounge room, use computer facilities or have a meal. They could also see a general practitioner, physiotherapist, dentist, podiatrist and have nursing care of wounds and other ailments dealt with. Unfortunately The Lounge Rome cannot offer accommodation.

Our first port of call was behind Federation Square where The Big Umbrella, a food relief organisation going on for 13 years, catered for over 60 with an extensive array of delicious meals from food salvaged from stores and cooked in a professional kitchen. They even managed to create a birthday cake for one of the ladies at short notice which was enjoyed by all.



Behind the scenes however there were continuous discussions with particular clients about their wellbeing, mental health and the administration of medicines.

The team then meandered to Flinders Street Station and up Swanston Street to the State Library amid throngs of pedestrians commuting and attending the numerous Asian food establishments at the top end. Along the way we engaged with those squatting on footpaths or in a wheelchair with their meagre belongings. Conversation was established and some accepted our handouts. The team then headed down Russell Street with further encounters before returning to base.

The whole experience was humbling with the prevalence of poverty in the streets but also the compassion and caring nature of the nurses from Youth Projects.
