



Rotary International Convention May 27- June 1 – personal snap shot

Over 12000 delegates, representing over 120 countries, attended this Rotary International Convention; The top five registering countries in order were the USA, Australia, Japan, the Philippines, and Taiwan.

One of the most inspiring moments to this writer at least was the march of the flags, part of the opening general ceremony on Sunday May 28, as shown in the photo below.



In my opinion, the highlight of the convention's entertainment program was the excellent performance by The Tenors at the close of the Opening General Session. This vocal group of four showcased their highly skilled talents, closing with a very good version of Queen's Bohemian rhapsody.

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A memorable and at the same time challenging thought was offered in song by Gabi Moreno, singer songwriter: 'sometimes nobody's wrong'. In other words, we need to appreciate and respect the opinion of others, even when we may at first regard it as wrong or unworthy of serious consideration.

Another memorable African saying that was offered is this; 'If you want to go fast, go alone; if you want to go far, go together.' As Rotarians I'm sure we can all see the wisdom of this age old advice.

Another early highlight came from Lehmah Gbowee, 2011 Nobel Peace Laureate and founder/ President of Gbowee Peace Foundation Africa. She observed that peace is not just the Absence of war, but it is the presence of dignity for all. She also declared that the spirit of collective humanity should drive what we do.

There were a range of break out sessions in the afternoons. These were all held at the Melbourne Exhibition and Convention Centre (MCC). Overall the convention program listed two hundred and seventy six presenters, although it is unlikely that they all presented.

One of the themes was Rotary and Indigenous Reconciliation in Australia. This session explained how a Rotaract Club and a Rotary Club in Australia are implementing a Reconciliation Action Plan that is endorsed by Reconciliation Australia. Rotarians can access the Reconciliation web site to see what other clubs have done vis a vis indigenous reconciliation.

The break out session on May 31 on the Rotary Ukraine Update on Relief Efforts was both distressing and inspiring. Discussion centred on the main goals of recovery —as summarised in the following slide —and the service projects being led by the District Coordinating Committee for the prevention of humanitarian disasters in the Ukraine.

The cost of this enormous task runs into the tens, probably more likely hundreds of billions of US dollars and will take decades. An article in the ABC news by Shelton and Mann posted on 9 June 2023 even more disturbingly states that an often forgotten casualty is Ukraine's natural environment, the impacts on which will also take decades to heal.


There were four speakers, all of Ukrainian descent. John Hewko, Rotary International General Secretary and Ukrainian born. His main point was to ask individual Rotarians to


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encourage their club / division to support the Ukrainian people and their country. RI District 2232 President Vital Lesko identified the main areas of urgent relief need.






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




Medical treatment and relief programs are understandably very high on the agenda, with the Rotary International Medical Team playing a critical role.







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




Mental health is another priority relief area.



Logistics is vital in all aspects of the relief effort.




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Especial care and relief is needed for Ukrainian children. This includes both medical aid and help with continuing children's education in war torn settings.

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Save the Maribyrnong meeting June 6 2023

Michael Cariss welcomed all members and guests with a special warm welcome to President Vera.

President Vera acknowledged that we were meeting on the lands of the Wurundjeri People of the Kulin Nation. We paid respect to their Ancestors and Elders, past, present, and emerging.

President Vera then welcomed the meeting's guest speaker, Dr Nicole Kowalczyk (Ecologist, Maribyrnong Officer, Education Manager MCC). President Vera noted that Andrew Panjkov will formally introduce her a little later.

President Vera then inducted three new members into RCE: John and Valmai Burns, and Deanhna Culshaw.



Valmai and John Burns have just transferred from the Woden Rotary Club in Canberra.

Valmai Burns has been appointed to the Youth Committee and Regina Davern has been appointed as her mentor. Valmai hoped her very fulfilling time in Rotary to date will continue into the future. Valmai has lots of experience working with youth, especially in the week of the Federal budget.

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John Burns is looking forward to joining his third Rotary club and noted that the Rotary Venture in Citizenship, aimed at introducing teenagers to our federal parliamentary system, is a great program.

The third inductee was Deanhna Culshaw. Deanhna is a vocational support advance officer. Her club mentor is Dr. Peter Condos. In accepting the induction Deanhna noted that she has been made to feel very welcome and appreciated members sharing her journey. Elderly people could be helped to learn to walk with appropriate aids.



Andrew Panjkov then introduced Dr Nicole Dr Nicole Kowalczyk, an ecologists who on presented on the care and development of Maribyrnong River in her role with the Maribyrnong Rivers and Waterways Association.

Dr Nicole Kowalczyk notes that the Maribyrnong runs about 130 kilometres to the city of Melbourne, and is sourced from the meeting of the Deep Creek and Jackson Creek on slopes of Mount Macedon.

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


John Batman noted in a journal entry in the middle of 1836 that the river's soil was rich, but treeless. He noted a profusion of quails flying 'at one time, quite a cloud.' John Batman noted a large lagoon at the upper end of the marsh. This lagoon was 'full of ducks, geese & c. After crossing this marsh, we passed through tea tree scrub very high and thick.'

Dr. Nicole noted that the Maribyrnong River has been home to the Wurundjeri people for over 40,000 years. Thousands of cultural sites have been recorded. Fertile soil and a large permanent river would have increased biodiversity. The land and waters of this region continue to hold spiritual and cultural significance to the Kulin nations.

The nineteenth century saw big but detrimental changes to the Maribyrnong. Rapid industrialisation created foul air, and filthy rivers, sometimes bright red in colour.

A similar degradation happened in the early twentieth century. As noted in the slide below the newly formed Essendon River League took remedial steps, including having the River renamed in 1913. Dr. Nicole noted that this River League undertook a huge tree planting program.



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Today, Dr. Nicole noted that the local community has expressed concerns about various aspects of the river. These concerns have formed the basis of the Maribyrnong strategic plan prepared by the Maribyrnong Rivers and Waterways Association. .

The plan's Vision:

The Maribyrnong River and surrounding waterways are care for, respected and protected for the well-being and survival of all communities that rely on them.

The Association's purpose:

We advocate for greater commitment and investment in protecting and restoring waterways in the Maribyrnong catchment.

Dr Nicole Kowalczyk informed that a web site is about to be launched, thanks to the support of many funders.

The final part of Dr. Nicole's presentation was a very informative fifteen minute video on the Maribyrnong Rive and related waterways.

A lively question and answer session followed before Andrew Panjkov wrapped the session up with a big thank you to Nicole and a small token of RCE's esteem.

Our wellness officer Maria is still unwell as is Peter Condos. Eleanor and Tony de Fazio are also not feeling well, nor is Kerry Roe. Hopefully all will have speedy recoveries.
