The Rotary Club of Essendon has had a long association with the Ruben Clinic in Kenya. Club delegations have visited the centre a number of times and members can verify that the clinic is doing a most amazing job. It is located in the Mukuru slums, one of the largest slum settlements in Nairobi.

The health centre provides much needed care to the residents who must deal with diseases caused by the extreme pollution in the slums. There is a high prevalence of respiratory diseases, malaria, HIV AIDS, Covid 19 and other waterborne diseases.

They live largely in one room corrugated iron shacks with many other relatives, sewerage runs freely along pathways between the shacks and clean water facilities and the very few latrines located in the slums are shared by twenty families or more. Very few have electricity so food sanitation is also a cause of illness. Crime, drug abuse and prostitution plague the area as many children are left without parents and many babies and mothers have died due to lack of sanitation and appropriate care in pregnancy and childbirth. This clinic is improving the lives of these people. Help improve the lives of these people.

BIG NEWS!

The Rotary club of Essendon in partnership with The Rotary Club of Utawala Kenya, were successful in receiving a District International Grant to support Ruben Centre Clinic, Kenya. The club's contribution is \$14,000 and The Rotary Foundation \$7,000.

The grant will purchase much needed medical equipment: a medical waste incinerator and a dental chair.

Ruben Centre is in Mukuru, one of the largest slums in Nairobi, they strive to provide educational, health, and community development programs to the residents of this community. Their efforts are geared towards helping individuals and families living in poverty to improve their quality of life. They believe that through education, healthcare, and community engagement, they can create a brighter future for the Mukuru community.

Guest speaker Catherine Scerri from BAHAY TULUYAN



They are all here to visit the supporters of BT in Australia and attend the fundraising dinner on Friday 18/08/2023.

Many RCE Rotarians have visited Bahay Tuluyan in Manilla and seen firsthand the great work they do with children living lives of extreme neglect, abuse, trauma and poverty. In a country where an estimated 20.6 million people are living in poverty, equating to 18.1% of the population, the need for an organisation such as BT is essential. Children involved with BT's programmes are given hope and a brighter future. Catherine gave a comprehensive presentation of the inspirational range of work BT is doing in the poorest communities in Manilla.

This series of photos highlights the latest involvement of the organisation, Project Rainbow. A house donated to BT is being transformed in to a space that will benefit children who have faced significant trauma.


WHAT HAS OUR BOOK CLUB BEEN READING LATELY?

Why is a massive bridge being built to connect the sleepy island of Bruny with the mainland of Tasmania? And why have terrorists blown it up?



When the Bruny bridge is bombed, UN trouble-shooter Astrid Coleman agrees to return home to help her brother before an upcoming election. But this is no simple task. Her brother and sister are on either side of politics, the community is full of conspiracy theories, her mother is fading and her father is quoting Shakespeare. Only on Bruny does the world seem sane. Until Astrid discovers how far the government is willing to go. Bruny is a searing, subversive novel about family, love, loyalty and the new world order. It is a gripping thriller with a jaw-dropping twist, a love story, a cry from the heart and a fiercely entertaining and crucial work of imagination that asks the burning question: what would you do to protect the place you love?

Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman.



In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing as an *average* woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans, the lonely, brilliant, Nobel Prize—nominated grudge holder who falls in love with—of all things—her mind. True chemistry results.

Like science, though, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother but also the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show, *Supper at Six*. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy. Because, as it turns out, Elizabeth Zott isn't just

teaching women how to cook. She's daring them to change the status quo. Laugh-out-loud funny, shrewdly observant and studded with a dazzling cast of supporting characters, *Lessons in Chemistry* is as original and vibrant as its protagonist.


Rotary started with the vision of one man — **Paul Harris.** The Chicago attorney formed the Rotary Club of Chicago on 23 February 1905, so professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form

meaningful, lifelong friendships. There are many stories about the reach of Rotary internationally. Here is one such story involving our club. Thanks to Stephen Chandler for the story and pictures.

The Wembley Story

Dr Sydney Newing, who lived at 13 Riverview Rd in Essendon, was a foundation member of the Rotary Club of Essendon who had retired as a doctor & was now running an investment company.

In 1937 he decided to head to the RI Convention in London with his wife Rene but due to the Coronation of King George VI being planned for late May the RI Convention was moved to Nice in France. Teddy Garner of the Rotary Club of Wembley England was to host Rotarians during the London convention and when



In 1938 Jack Edgar, Essendon Rotarian & Headmaster of Essendon High School was attending a meeting at

the Rotary Club of London & coincidently sat next to Teddy Garner who was also a visitor. This led to a great friendship between the Rotary Clubs of Wembley, Essendon, Syd Newing & Jack Edgar, (who was a District Governor from 1946-48). After the war the RCE sent food parcels to Wembley Rotary Club & Wembley sent 208 pounds to Essendon to assist with the building of their Pioneers Retreat on the banks of the Maribrynong.

In 1956, Teddy Garner was trying to assist a friend's brother Jakob Kaldor, a Jewish Yugoslav to escape the Communists. He attempted to get them into the UK, to the USA, to Brazil & other countries but they were knocked back each time. He then decided to call upon his friends from the RCE who willing agreed. Approach was made to Harold Holt the then Immigration Minister and eventually permission was







granted with the RCE providing employment for 12 months in Percy Jurss's presidential year with Jakob working as a research scientist at the Fairfield Infectious Diseases Hospital on Hepatitis.

In 1964 Teddy Garner travelled by boat to Australia and bought with him a Secret Gift which he presented to the then President of the RCE, Royce Abbey, The Wembley Wheel Of Friendship. His wish was that each new club sponsored in District 9800 would hold the wheel until another club was sponsored. The 1st Club in 1974 was the Rotary Club of Brighton and it continued until the Rotary Club of Docklands was sponsored in 2007.



In 1991 Teddy Garner wrote to President Michael Cariss to advise him that in his will he was going to leave an amount of US\$200,000 in the Rotary Foundation for a Teddy Garner Scholarship to be awarded in turn by The Rotary Clubs of Essendon, Wembley, Melbourne North, Aylesbury District, Grovedale and Great Missenden with students from London to be sent to a Melbourne University & students from Australia to be sent to a London University. It was the interest earned on these invested funds that was to be used but it is not known whether they have been called upon or if the fund still exists, but we have a copy of the letter sent to Michael Cariss & a copy of what was intended to be in his donation to the Rotary Foundation.
