The next speaker was our club historian Stephen Chandler. Stephen presented an interesting and informative sketch of Sir Angus Mitchell.








### C O N T A C T

Angus Mitchell was Chairman of Mitchell and Bellair, successful grain brokers when he joined the Rotary Club of Melbourne in 1927. A very philanthropic man he was responsible for establishing and being a sponsor for many children charities including to do with unemployed youths, scouts and the Lord Somers Camp. In 1934-35 when the Rotary Club of Essendon was in the process of being formed, Angus Mitchell was the District Governor for District 65 which covered most of Australia and so was heavily involved in the formation of The Rotary Club of Essendon. He is featured in the middle of the front row of the photo of the Foundation members of The Rotary Club of Essendon and became a frequent visitor to the club, so much so that a special badge with the classification of Visitor was made for him. He wrote articles about the projects of The Rotary Club of Essendon which were submitted to The Rotarian, giving the young club an International profile.

In 1947- 48 Angus Mitchell was inducted as President of Rotary International and during his presidential year he travelled over 100,000 miles meeting many clubs as the world began to rebuild after the devastation of the 2nd World War. His mantra was that only through Friendliness, understanding and goodwill could the world rebuild. Angus was determined to re establish Rotary in Japan and Germany after the war and had constant dialogue with former Rotarians from both Countries with 5 Rotary Clubs being re established in Japan and 2 in Germany during his Presidential year.

Angus Mitchell was Knighted in 1956 for his Charity Work and being the first Australian President of Rotary International. Sir Angus Mitchell continued his visitations to the Rotary Club of Essendon and there are photos of him in the Club History with Rotarians at Edenhope in 1957, Cutting the cake at the 25th Charter Night in 1960 and opening the new wing of Gladswood Aged Care Home.

Jeannette's first insight is that 'succession planning starts today' and that informed advice is strongly recommended.

She covered a range of topics. One of the most concerning changes to the settlement of wills is that bank will now not release money from a deceased estate without probate. Jeannette advises that wills should be reviewed whenever personal circumstances change.

Jeanette answered a number of questions around the legal aspects of wills and how contesting a will has become lot more complex and contestable since a change of law in 1998. She recounted a couple of examples where people unrelated to the deceased legally contested the will on rather tenuous grounds. Fortunately their excessive claims were not allowed.
