The Rotary Foundation provides grants to Rotary Clubs worldwide to financially support projects of importance. Money donated to our Foundation provides the ability to give these grants. It is the charity under which finances are managed. It has a 4-star 100% rating in the Charity Navigator's list which is the highest level. 91% of funds are spent on program awards and operations.

David Abbey gave a lovely talk about how the Royce and Jean Abbey Endowed Fund and Vocational Scholarship programme began and was named for his father Royce Abbey who was a Rotary International World President and his mother. Roger Leask spoke about the start of the awards which were created to fund the scholarships. We then eagerly awaited the big announcement.

The secure case with the golden envelope containing the winner of the award

was delivered under heavy security to the Chair of the RAA committee and host for the night, Maria Kouppas. It was

publicly opened and Dennis Shore, was called to do the honours of opening and announcing the recipient. The room hushed as Dennis opened the envelope, smiled broadly and declared that Murray Verso (current Zone 8 End Polio Now co-ordinator, Past District Governor, District Foundation Chair, Rotary Peace Fellowships Subcommittee Chair) has been awarded a Royce Abbey Award. However much to everyone's surprise Maria discovered another golden envelope in the case! What??? Unable to split the points in the final count the committee had to award equally to two Rotarians who have dedicated themselves over many years to Rotary. Who was this second awardee???

The task fell to newly minted RAA Murray Verso open the envelope. His eyes sparkled, he grinned and looked



straight at the man next to him - Dennis Shore! It was surprising that the roof didn't fly right off the building such was the applause that Dennis had also received a well-deserved RAA. Dennis has or is currently Trustee of The Rotary Foundation from 2023-27, D9800 District Director Governance, Rotary Endowment/Major Gift Advisor; Past District Governor, Rotary International; Citation for Meritorious Service and District Service Award from The Rotary Foundation plus heaps more! Maria declared that both awards would be designated as the 500th award to be known as 500a and 500b. Both are well known in Rotary International having served at high levels in the organisation. The Rotary Club of Essendon in Myanmar

Our club has a long and proud association with the people of Myanmar. For over 12 years we have provided vital equipment and funds to care for those who are most vulnerable. And whenever we provide aide a delegation of club members travel under their own cost to ensure complete accountability and care is taken in these projects.

Recently led by Rotarian Richard Lawrence a team again visited our friends and associates in Myanmar.

Presentations included attending The Myanmar Liver Foundation at Than Sitt Charity Clinic. The Foundation at the Clinic sees around 1,500 patients in a year and of these 800 or so need medical imaging. This year it was a specialised liver ultrasound scanner and supplies, which are vital for management of patients with chronic liver disease that was delivered and was greatly appreciated by all the staff. This ultrasound is mobile and will greatly facilitate their workload.



The Rotary Club of Essendon has annual visits to Myanmar for over 12 years with the supply of medical equipment to hospitals, provision of oxygen concentrators during the Covid pandemic, food supplies to orphanages, construction of a raised road from one of the orphanages to allow children to attend school when flooded, as well as many other projects. Our most recent endeavour is to support and protect children being abused in the illicit body organ trade with the help of a local charity Step-In Step-Up in Yangon.
