







As the racing ducks paddled



Kerry Anderson has assisted many young — and not so young — rural entrepreneurs to achieve their dreams of creating and running a new business. She has interviewed and written about their stories in her book "Australian Rural Entrepreneurs — Redefining the Future". So Kerry has gained a greater understanding of what an entrepreneur is, and isn't, and what makes them unique.

Over time Kerry has discovered 10 main attributes that all successful entrepreneurs have;

They are * visionary * courageous * passionate * determined * are good at problem solving * innovative * opportunistic * agile * creative and * collaborative.

So regardless of what the business is, people who dream of starting their own business with a unique twist or need in their community, Kerry has found that those that make a success of their dream have these innate qualities. All will need some help along the way to success as the skills to make a business successful require other specialists in their fields. You may be an IT specialist but you will need a good accountant, you may know how to run a bakery but you need a good baker. You get the idea.







Kerry recognises and supports entrepreneurs, specifically in the rural sector, to make a real go of their dream. She is a champion for rural businesses through practical community-based programmes and was named in the Top 50 Australian Regional Agent of Change list.

"Kerry empowers rural communities to take control of their own destiny through the innovative Operation Next Gen and Be Your Own Boss programs offered Australia wide. In 2017 she was one of two Australians invited by the Kauffman Foundation to Kansas City bringing practitioners worldwide together to share best practice in building collaborative entrepreneurship ecosystems."

On 26 January 2022 Kerry was awarded the Order of Australia Medal for her services to business and community development.

It is our sad duty to inform you of the passing of Carmel Lamers at the age of 101. Many will remember Carmel's husband Jim, a valued former member of the Rotary Club of Essendon who died in 2011 at the age of 86.

Carmel and Jim met in Bendigo in 1945 while Jim was serving in the RAAF. Following WW2, Jim trained as a physiotherapist, becoming an electrotherapy and sports physiotherapy pioneer. He developed the first ever TENS pain-relief machine.

Carmel and Jim had three children, seven grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren and enjoyed an active and varied life which included many sailing trips on a 26-foot motor-cruiser which Jim had personally built. "Access to safe water, sanitation and hygiene is the most basic human need for health and well-being. Billions of people will lack access to these basic services in 2030 unless progress quadruples. Demand for water is rising owing to rapid population growth, urbanization and increasing water needs from agriculture, industry, and energy sectors.

The demand for water has outpaced population growth, and half the world's population is already experiencing severe water scarcity at least one month a year. Water scarcity is projected to increase

with the rise of global temperatures as a result of climate change.

Investments in infrastructure and sanitation facilities; protection and restoration of water- related ecosystems; and hygiene education are among the steps necessary to ensure universal access to safe and affordable drinking water for all by 2030, and improving water-use efficiency is one key to reducing water stress." https://www.un.org/sustainabledevelopment/water-and-sanitation
