Despite not being able to meet "in person," many hours of committee and board Zoom meetings made things happen.

To keep members engaged each week, the Program Committee tapped into the availability of remote presentations to provide outstanding program speakers.



The need for our club to take a stand on diversity became evident when – what some consider insensitive comments –were made to the media following a club meeting by one of our speakers. We could have put our head in the sand; we could have shrugged and moved on. But you know Rotarians are People of Action. We turned to those who are passionate about this moment in time for our nation, our community and our club. During our club's 105th anniversary year we officially formed our club's first IDEA (Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Access) Committee.

We took action in other areas, too.

Our Strategic Plan was updated and we placed greater emphasis on Service Above Self and the Four-Way Test – the heart and soul of Rotary. In addition, we strengthened our connections to the Rotary District and to Rotary International.

During this year, our longtime Executive Coordinator, Roberta (Bert) Oberdick retired, and our Human Resources Committee was instrumental in hiring our new Executive Director, Lynne Morrison.

It was an honor for me to lead our club for the past 12 months alongside Rotarians and staff who united and gave generously of their amazing expertise, influence and passion to create lasting change.

What We Accomplished

Charitable Grants

Over the past 20 years, more than \$500,000 has been awarded to local non-profit organizations in support of our community's children. This year, with a focus on addressing abused and exploited children, grants totaling \$19,566 were given to the Children's Home of York, EquiTeam Support Services and Turning Point Counseling and Advocacy Center.

Because of COVID-19's dramatic and wide-ranging impact on our children and the inability to distribute funds, the committee will combine the 2020-2021 annual allocation with the 2021-2022 grant cycle to address child food insecurity in York County.

The Trees for the Trail committee is pleased to report that the vast majority of the 200 trees that were planted have survived along the Susquehanna Trail and are thriving. During heat waves, Bartlett Tree Experts, under the leadership of Rotarian Christian Fitzpatrick, water the young trees along the busy road. Volunteers removed the stakes, ties, and water donuts. These were donated to the York County Parks System. Replacing the few trees that didn't survive was postponed due to COVID-19.


The "Love Fore Community" Golf/Tennis/Croquet Outing was held at the Country Club of York in September 2020. More than 150 participants enjoyed a day of golf, croquet, tennis, and corn hole along with a delicious buffet dinner and silent auction. The \$42,480 raised supported the Kiwanis Lake Restoration project, York City Little League, Bearcat Interact Club and Childcare Scholarships.

In May 2020, the club participated in the "Give Local York" event, raising \$23,370. The proceeds also helped to pay for improvements to the Kiwanis Lake Restoration project.



Global and District Grants Jane Conover

The Global Grants Committee recommended, and the board approved, two grants. The first grant of \$15,000 supported the Teacher **Empowerment Program in Honduras** to train teachers across the country in partnership with the Chula Vista Rotary Club in California. The goal is to expand education to more children in a country where less than 50 percent of children complete primary school. A second grant for \$3,000 was to support the purchase of medical equipment for a medical clinic in Rio Grande, Argentina, in partnership with the North York Rotary Club. Distribution of global grants is a stellar example of how gifts to the Rotary Foundation are making an impact in the neediest communities around the world.




Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Accessibility Task Force cal Weary

This year the York Rotary Club of York took a natural step towards the betterment of the club by forming the IDEA Task Force to examine the club's current practices pertaining to Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Accessibility (Creating the acronym IDEA). The committee is chartered to influence the club's strategy, programs and membership. Meeting twice a month, the Task Force implemented a club wide diversity survey and helped other committees and our executive board to be mindful of IDEA as we address our own culture and increase engagement with the community. Support was provided for local organization Bro2Go, bringing motivational speaker Wallo267 who addressed gun violence and life after prison with city youth. IDEA continues its mission with planned activities to inform and educate members, including a Courageous Conversations series to allow members of the club to speak openly and freely about this important subject, as well as expanded information and training.



Legacy/Planned Giving Glenn Miller

The Legacy Committee was quiet in this "year of years," adding only one new Rotarian to the list of those who have chosen to remember the club in their wills and estate planning. The fruits of legacy gifts continued to make a dramatic impact on the club, on young people, and on the community. Scholarships continued to be awarded from funds such as the Non-Traditional Scholarship Fund. Community improvements continued from funds like LaMotte Fund.

The Angel Program benefitted two non-profit organizations at the holidays: The Children's Home of York, and the Cornerstone Youth Home. Rotarians purchased one toy and a robe for each of the 12 second through fourth grade boys in residence at Cornerstone Youth Home. Additionally, gift cards and monetary donations were collected from Rotarians to purchase holiday gifts for the sponsored children at The Children's Home of York. Items were personally selected by committee members in December 2020 and January 2021.

The Literacy committee's main area of focus is our annual Book Fund Drive. Thanks to the generous support of member Rotarians, we presented checks to two organizations: \$1,000 to Center Director Carman Banzaca of the Child Development Center at First Church of the Brethren, and \$1,500 to Major Tom Babbit of the Salvation Army Learning Center. From these funds, more than 200 children will have access to age-appropriate books in their classrooms and camps.

Despite the challenges of the Pandemic, the Club's Rotary Foundation giving by our members stepped up to financially support the excellent Global Causes and important local projects that the Rotary Foundation funds. The Rotary Club of York's FY 2021 goal for Foundation giving was exceeded. In 2020-2021 we increased the number of Paul Harris Fellows by 10 to 175 and major donors by 2 to14. Preserve Planet Earth (PPE) took on an ambitious project in 2020 to rehabilitate Kiwanis Lake. The lake was overpopulated with wildlife, overwhelmed with debris and the mechanical features of the lake had failed. We are transforming the lake, its water quality and its park into the beautiful asset that it had once been. Completion is targeted for 2021.

The floodgate has been repaired, lights and fountains have been added and a new Smart Lake feature allows the lake to be monitored by the city and its communities to prevent water quality issues in the future.

In the midst of a worldwide pandemic with COVID-19, remote programing was first mastered and eventually shifted to hybrid presentations with some members being "in the room" at the Country Club of York and others watching remotely. An on-site IT meeting specialist guaranteed that our Zoom virtual and hybrid meetings ran smoothly and ensured that the virtual audience could always ask questions of our speakers. Members were able to hear and see outstanding speakers that they otherwise would not have.

We heard from our community leaders including the Mayor, County President Commissioner and the two candidates for Congress. We celebrated Ron Martin's retirement and heard from York College's Dr. Gunther-Smith and Miss Pennsylvania. The retirement of our longtime Executive Coordinator, Roberta (Bert) Oberdick, was also celebrated. Her service of over 25 years was met with a standing ovation.

We took inspiration from a memorable presentation by Dr. Sylvia Whitlock of California, who led the way for women to become Rotarians – and leaders – of Rotary Clubs. The fight for equal rights for women in Rotary went all the way to the highest court in the land. It was a U.S. Supreme Court ruling that forced RI to accept women.

We celebrated some lofty 100th anniversaries, like women's right to vote and our own United Way of York County. We heard from established businesses like Elsner Engineering, learned from startups like cyberconIQ, were wowed by a movement in York for youth "Pedal 4 Peace" and excited to hear about a huge solar initiative happening right here in York County.

\$56,000 in Whitely Educational Loans were awarded to 28 full-time college students. The maximum loan amount was \$2,000. Whitely Loans may be granted for a maximum of four academic years for undergraduate studies only.












Youth Exchange Walt Tilley




Financial Information

Donations from members In 2020 –2021 raised \$226,426 to support its mission and programs. Endowed funds and other contributions contributed an additional \$25,106 to enable a total of \$251,532 to be disbursed.


- Members donated \$38,990 to the Rotary Foundation.
