Last Week

Last week Carol K. McGinley, Esq. addressed us on "Lawyers and Ethics." She illustrated the ethical dilemas facing attorneys, and pointed out that while the public wants attorneys to adhere to the highest ethical standards, sometimes individual clients want their attorneys to bend the truth. Carol McGinley based her presentation on the conflict that arises from maintaining strict confidentiality with the client, and at the same time candor with the court. She illustrated this conflict arising in a situation when a criminal client admits his guilt to his attorney, demands to plead innocent, take the stand and perjures himself, still requires that his attorney defend him. Further, she mentioned a situation where a client asks to have all of his affairs put in order, and indicates that he then intends to commit suicide. In such a case, what is the real interest of the client? Would it be justified to break confidence?

Carol pointed out that almost never are there absolute rules by which such ethical dilemmas may be resolved. In her address one element became quite clear; such respect is given to the principle of confidentiality between attorney and client that, in almost every case, the ethical tensions are left within the attorney to resolve.

We thank Attorney Carol K. McGinley for insights into some of the more puzzling and intricate aspects of the legal profession. Frank Concannon was chairman of the meeting.
