**Welcome:** President Noreen welcomed all and opened the meeting sharing a sad moment. Doug Surina, former Dover Rotarian, passed away suddenly this past week. Funeral arrangement have yet to be announced.

**Rotary Club of Dover Board Meeting** was held yesterday and the Board voted to award several donations and discussed other requests. My Friends Place will receive \$3000 to replace a badly worn and mildewed carpet in the children's room. The Board also voted to support the Dover Fireworks with a \$2500 donation.

Also discussed was Phase II of the Dover Library Project. More information regarding plans has been requested. They would also appreciate any help in storing the children's books while the new bookcases are being installed in the upper level early childhood room. Rotarians willing to store the books for a period of time may pick up the books at the library.

Jay S. reported for the **Community Giving Committee** and thanked the members for their diligence and consideration of the requests received. The committee has awarded \$8450 of its \$10,000 budget and expects several requests which will exhaust the remaining funds. They plan to visit an Orphanage, a school for autistic children, a village where 20 families have provided homes for an average of 12 orphans each, and they will learn about micro-credit programs. They will visit with three Romanian Rotary Clubs and plan to travel throughout the district when they return sharing their adventure.

## **Program - Dr. Lukas Kolm, Dir., Seacoast Emergency Services**

Dr. Kolm is the head of Emergency Services at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital. His early plans for a career did not include medicine and in his early years growing up in the Boston area he planned on becoming a fish farmer. His journey toward aquaculture was short lived as he found he was not ready for serious study. After a stint in a small college in the Ohio valley, he returned to New England and started a landscaping and snow removal business. He decided to return to school and took adult ed. classes with the goal of entering UNH. When taking an EMT class, he found his calling and decided to enter the field of medicine.

Dr. Kolm finds this a very interesting time in the field of medicine. Much is changing and the way people want to receive their medical services is changing. He terms this a period of market disruption in the field of medicine and the opening of emergent services, emergency treatment centers and walk-in health care is changing the landscape. On demand services are becoming the norm. Patients are looking for services that provide what they need, where they need it and when they desire it.

As head of the Emergency department at Wentworth-Douglass he sees this opening up of services as an opportunity to deliver quality care. Wentworth-Douglass is no longer a small community hospital. It is seeing cases with greater acuity and is delivering specialized care in a number of areas. He views competition as a good thing. Micro-hospitals and partnerships are providing opportunity for better care for patients. Relationships with primary care physicians have changed and people can now receive services in a variety of locations due to electronic health records and referrals for specialized treatment. Patients may well receive initial care, stabilization and ongoing treatment in different locations. Partnerships will be beneficial and there needs to be transparent conversations about the future of healthcare.

Dr. Kolm answered a number of questions regarding healthcare including transport procedures, ambulance service areas, staffing shortages and incentives necessary to attract new doctors and medical personnel.
