Program - Inna Alex Lehman "The positive impact exchange programs have on our community."

Bio: Inna Alex Lehman is originally from Leningrad, [now St. Petersburg] Russia and has lived here for the last 29 years. She has lived in Dover at least 15 of those years.

Professionally she worked as a teacher, trainer, interpreter and translator. Her work has been always related to international exchanges, languages and culture.

She will talk about various international exchange programs that she is involved in and discuss how these programs can benefit local communities.

Presentation:

Cultural Homestay International (CHI) is one of the older, non-profits in US, almost 39 years. Involved in many exchange programs. Inna talked about two programs today.

- 1. J1 visa when we sponsor graduate and post graduate students in US, they come for 12 or 18 months and work here. No taxes, comes to thousands in savings for the businesses. The students come for the experience. Engineers, accountants, social media, they have degrees and they work and live in the area.
- 2. The Short Term Enrichment Program sponsors students to come for a few weeks. Mostly now students from China but used to be from Japan and other countries.

Designated by Department of State to facilitate the J-1 visas and visitor's visas. They cannot work for money. Au pair, camp leaders, work and travel. Introduction to business and culture, they come to travel and volunteer, host families are reimbursed for the expense.

Live with host family and volunteer during the day: museum, library, and many other non-profits. Travel during the weekends to local landmarks, go to NYC or Boston, or other areas.

They all speak very good English, even though some underestimate themselves, they learn from TV, and how to read and write and they are shy.

They can volunteer for many non-profit organizations — can volunteer for more than 15 hours, that is a minimum.

Between the ages of 18 - 30 but most of them are 18-25 years old. The graduates can come for longer periods because they do not need to back to school.

Parents feel better than just sending kids traveling. Some of the students never traveled before and they feel better staying with someone local.
