Freestanding Emergency Building in Dover: Portsmouth Hospital

Slated to open by April 22.

Invited to join for Open House, Thursday, 4/18, bring kids as a kid-friendly event.

Colleague is Grant Turpin here, person who wears many hats

Plans in the works for 2.5 years.

Freestanding Emergency Centers have facilities equivalent to in-hospital emergency rooms.

Dover is growing so needs are as well – this is a big benefit to Dover. Dealing with opioid crisis victims will be an important service.

Emergency Rooms, Urgent Care, Walk-In Clinics – all are distinct types of entities with different licensing issues, different insurance coverages, not overlapping in services.

Community Involvement is important – Main Street, in the schools, working with police and other city services and entities.

Where one is taken by ambulance in emergency is fairly closely regulated now by the state.
