Program: Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)

Three staff members (Kaitlin, Emily and JC) and one first-time camper, Cloe, spoke of the life-changing nature of RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards), a 4-day camp experience. All three staff are former participants. The camp is serving 140 students age 15/16 after the sophomore year in high school. There are 12 staff who come from all over the country, returning each year to pass along the benefits they received.

RYLA began in Australia in 1965. Dick, Donna & Phil Rinaldi were instrumental in getting our club involved.

Each presenter gave heart-felt testimonials to how much more impactful this experience was than they expected or as compared to other experiences. Emily spoke of how the experience brought her out of her shy shell. Cloe spoke of learning “to be comfortable with being uncomfortable.”

Programs during the week focus on Ethics, Community Building, Public Speaking and more.

The group took us through the schedule for a typical RYLA camp, emphasizing as well the concluding event to consider how to apply the lessons learned outside the “RYLA Bubble” of the camp time.
