Program: Marc Blumenthal, Exec. Dir., Social Ventures Foundation



Marc Blumenthal is the executive director of Social Ventures Foundation. The Social Ventures Foundation mission is focused on a new paradigm of doing "Business with a Purpose" through the identification, promotion and invention of Social Ventures that provide sustainable market creation for the 3 to 4 billion poor at the "Bottom of the Pyramid.

The focus of his presentation was Microcredit.

From the organization website:

Microcredit has enabled thousands of the poor to start their own enterprises, but it leaves it up to the individual to come up with their own idea for a self-employment business, often producing an overabundance of similar types of low wage/low tech enterprises such as small retail stands and handcrafts. Today MicroCredit has moved up the "risk-averse ladder" requiring revenue track records exceeding 6 months, making it even more challenging for the poor to "jump-start" a business. MicroFranchising is the flip side of MicroCredit, given that it is focused on underwriting proven business models that are sustainable and can be scaled. Marc Blumenthal, Executive Director of the SVF, initially presented his Micro Franchise model at the MIT Media Lab and at the Media Lab Asia in 2001. His model focused on market creation by creating sustainable self-employment opportunities for the poor that delivered meaningful social impact for the poor at a price the poor could afford. However, at the time, International Development Agencies were loath to engage in a business solution to poverty reduction, so he shelved the MicroFranchise model rollout. Recently he was invited to present the model again in his role as Executive Director of the Social Ventures Foundation at the "Bottom of the Pyramid Summit" (BoP) in New Delhi, India in April of 2018.

Specifically, the organization has created V'ice. V'ice provides an innovative solution to two of Haiti's most overwhelming obstacles: massive unemployment affecting 70% of the population, and a nation-wide health crisis: vitamin and protein deficiency impacting children and adults. Made from clean water, the V'ice Shaved Ice Cone meets local vitamin supplementation needs as identified by the Haitian Health Ministry and USAID. Made to be affordable to all at 10 cents per cone. Available in Raspberry, Lime, Banana, Mango and Blueberry. In just one year they have perfected the V'ice vitamin formulation, designed and built V'ice prototypes, and opened our first office and hub of activity in Port-au-Prince, Haiti's capital and poorest city. Our dream is that within 5 years, the V'ice social venture model will provide sustainable vitamin supplementation to over 5 million children and adults annually.
