She will begin her nursing studies next semester and plans on studying a variety of nursing areas as part of her journey.

Program: Donnett Sackie – New Journey Academy

Donnett Sackie is a success story. As a five-year-old he left his homeland on Liberia during the 1989 civil war along with his mom and four siblings. His journey took him to Sierra Leone, then on to Ivory Coast and Ghana before migrating to the United States. Donnett became a standout soccer player and played college ball in Utah. He was recruited by UNH and received a full scholarship to play for the Wildcats. Donnett received his bachelor's degree in Communications from UNH and has made New Hampshire his home. As an Uber driver, he had gave a ride to a person who, upon hearing his story, introduced him to Steve Kniaz of the Durham-Great Bay Rotary. Donnett joined this past year.

Donnett spoke of growing up in a refugee camp in Ghana following a search for safety through the United Nations which led him first to the Ivory Coast and then to onto Sierra Leone. He told of making bracelets from clothesline and selling them to get money to help feed his family. Through a United Nations contact named Max, he played soccer on a refugee soccer team and learned the love of the game. Through another United Nations worker, Megan, he was able to gain admission to Wasatch Academy, a private boarding school in Utah. While Donnett was enrolled as a junior, he discovered his previous education only put him at an eighth-grade level. He worked hard on his education, and he excelled in soccer. He became the student body president and graduated in 2014. His plan was to return

to Liberia; however his accomplishments led him to college in Utah and finally to a soccer scholarship offer from the University of New Hampshire.

Donnett learned discipline at UNH and discovered it was as important to understand not only what we can do, but also why we do it. He declared his graduation from UNH was the highlight of his life. He wanted to give back and started the New Journey Academy to serve children in Liberia. The school is located in a very poor area of Monrovia with little access to education, food and housing. Water access is also limited and people have to travel far just to get fresh water. Donnett purchased a plot of land and began building a school to serve children. The structure is complete except for a roof. Other necessities including water, sanitation, school supplies and food are still needed. Donnett has funded this himself, but Rotarians in Durham and Liberia are now looking to help. Donnett stated that New Journey Academy will focus on a foundation. He is using his story to encourage children to learn, set goals and gain an education. Many come because of soccer, but they must attend school to be able to play. Seventeen children are currently enrolled.

While they have not yet been opened, The Rotary Club of Sinkor in Monrovia, is the prospective applicant for two global grants to help achieve Donnett's vision for the school. Durham-Great Bay Rotary has stepped forward to be the international partner for a grant.

She said that the workers at CAP cheered her arrival when she brought a new batch of vouchers to them this month.

Bingo Committee: Ken P. has asked that we have a Bingo Committee meeting next Wed., after our club meeting. Bingo continues to be very busy. We hosted 112 players last week and we sold 29 boxes of tickets.
