President-elect Cathy B. welcomed all to the Rotary club of Dover, NH and welcomed guest speaker Peter Saliba, Executive Director of the Mayhew Program.

Program: Mayhew Program, Briston, NH – Peter Saliba, Ex. Dir.

Bio: Peter Saliba has been in education for more than 30 years, with the majority of time spent in Maine and New Hampshire. He has worked at the Holderness School in Plymouth, the Tilton School in Tilton and Berwick Academy in South Berwick. He has been at Mayhew since September, succeeding Dover resident Jim Nute as Mayhew's sixth Executive Director.

In his second presentation since becoming executive director of the Mayhew Program three months ago, Peter Saliba, asked Rotarians if they knew about Mayhew. Three members were acquainted. Steve P. said the Teen Center in Dover has connected with the Mayhew in their support of at-risk boys.

Mayhew's mission: "Mayhew challenges and helps at-risk New Hampshire boys to believe in themselves, work well with others, and find their best. It is the only all-boys program in the state that combines school-year mentoring and a residential summer program for at-risk boys, tuition-free, through high school graduation."

According to Steve the Mayhew program originated in 1893 when the Groton School, an independent boarding school in Groton, MA, began operation of a summer camp for underprivileged boys on Groton Island near Squam Lake. In 1920 it moved to Mayhew Island, an uninhabited Island on Newfound Lake. From this new location, the GSC continued serving needy boys from New England's urban

areas until 1966, when the focus of Groton's efforts turned to matters on campus. After renovations the in the 60s and early 70s the camp became the Mayhew Program. In 1990 the camp burned to the ground and was mostly rebuilt thanks to generous donors.

Peter said at-risk boys are believed to be in crisis "more likely to be expelled and often shelter challenged." Referrals come from school counselors who understand the program and the boys who can be helped. At risk girls have a similar program through the Circle Program in Plymouth, an outgrowth of the Mayhew program, he added.

Mayhew's success is based on carefully choosing expert staff with the right skill sets to manage the 3-week summer camp experienced. "Our kids come when they are 10 years old." They can continue coming until the 12th grade but the older boys generally stop coming when they are old enough to get summer jobs. Since 1969 Mayhew has welcomed 2,400 boys, 247 from the Seacoast towns of NH.

Questions:

Values? 1. Respect for others and oneself, 2. Working together as a team, and 3. Developing stretch goals to motivate themselves.

Funding? \$1.5 million budget, they raise \$700,000 from individual donations, \$400,000 from grants, \$8, 000 from the Federal food program and the remainder from a small endowment's interest.

Define at-risk? At or below the poverty line, struggling family life (single parents, orphans), referred from school counselors.

Professional development? Staff complete all state-mandated education, suicide prevention training and curriculum design.

Disabled access? The island location is not currently ADA accessible but will soon redesign main lodge for ADA compliance.

Do boys stay through the teen years? No all. Often move on, some go to jail, most gain skills and just outgrow the program.

What's on island? 37 acres, no technology allowed – must communicate by letters, boys sleep in cabins of 8 bunks.

Why choose to work at Mayhew? I retired as a headmaster and I love teenagers – have to be wired that way.
