Program: New President's Message

Three score and ten years ago, Gregg Dowty was born in Somerset, MA, the second of four boys - all 3 years apart. His amazing parents instilled the value of education in their sons who went on to earn four Bachelor degrees, five Master degrees, two Advanced Graduate degrees and one Doctorate. Three went on to become college professors, a Lt. Col., a HS football coach and one, Gregg D., is now President of a Rotary Club.

The words of Gregg's parents continue to influence him today. Gregg recalled his mother saying "Everything happens for a reason" and "Some good comes out of everything." His dad reminded him that even in adversity, "You've got to work with the best in people." And, he plans to do just that.

A graduate of the U. of Maine where he met his wife Liz, now married for 47 years and, he admits, "she is still looking for the best" in him. After graduating from U. of

Maine, he was drafted and joined the US Navy Reserve for six years. His first teaching job was in a two-room school at the Magalloway Plantation in a Maine/NH border town. He moved on to Central Maine where he taught 7th and 8th grade, became a school principal and elementary school supervisor. In 1993 he accepted the role of Deputy Director of the Good Will-Hinckley boarding school for at-risk youth and completed his Doctorate in Education from the U. of Maine. In 2006 his took on "the hardest job I've every had" at the Children's Home of Easton, Allentown, PA., for kids in trouble.

The school was also in trouble and Gregg and his team set out to make changes following the Gung Ho (Chinese for 'working together') program which is based on three animal attributes: the spirit of the squirrel, the way of the beaver and the gift of the goose. In many ways he noted Rotary is also rooted in the working together concept.

Gregg retired four years ago and moved to Dover (and later to South Berwick) to be close to his daughter and her twin boys. After joining Rotary in PA, he felt Rotary would be a good way to connect to his new community. The wisdom table Rotarians were his first companions and influenced his choice to join the club.

"Onward and Upward" will be Gregg's tag line this year in light of the challenges the club will face in this year of unknowns. "I will look for new opportunities," he said, "and embrace change, take care of our members and stay focused on our core values."

Budget 2020-21:

Pres. Gregg reviewed the operations and charities budgets noting the estimated amount for bingo profit may be high or low based on what happens during the year. He also noted the budget showed a loss of \$51,500 if all programs are fully funded - a loss that could be covered by other savings and investments currently available to the club of close to \$300,000. Of those funds, \$200,000 are invested in an Edward Jones account - the Board will soon be developing a policy on the use of these funds. A motion to approve the budget as presented, made by Ute L. and seconded by Nancy B., was passed unanimously.

Club Goals:

Pres. Gregg reviewed his goals for the year:

Club membership - add 6 new members and retain current members

Service participation - track Rotarian service hours on Rotary projects and with other community groups

District Conference - encourage strong participation - Marion C. will be chairing the event in Kennebunkport at the Colony in 2021

District Training - encourage good attendance, usually have 10 or more Dover Rotarians attend

Foundation - \$9,000 goal

Meetings & Social events - greatest challenge in light of the virus

Past Presidents - meetings will consider strategic thinking on emerging issues

Collaborations - vital to join with other non-profits and businesses in the community

Club video - highlight the good works of Dover Rotary for PR and member recruitment
