Program: Sarah McCarron-Stewart, Chemistry Teacher at DHS - Reset Day

An enthusiastic teacher and student advocate, Sarah described her efforts to form the first Reset Day at Dover High School, held on Jan. 19, 2024. The motive of Reset Day was to recognize the reality of student and teacher burnout, their struggles to find balance and to learn the value of rest. Students chose one of six types of rest in six different school locations to begin and were able to move back and forth during the day. The areas were: physical, mental, emotional, social, creative and sensory. 80 local volunteers participated in the rest sessions including activities like basketmaking, succulent planting, creating a Zen garden, making slime, playing Sponge Bob, and crashing proms.

Thanks to community donors, including Rotary, hot chocolate and other treats were enjoyed by all participants. Several students were uncertain about what to expect from this first of a kind event but upon reflection at the end they noted "it was WAY better than expected." Mr. Driscoll, DHS principal, even played UNO and lost.

From Jim V.:

Today at the meeting I agreed to send information and contact details for helping with the Haitian family that is being supported by SISC NST. Here goes. Copied to Shelley Hartz who convenes the group of volunteers and Jeremiah Dickinson who is coordinating transportation.

Nadeige and Erlande Charles are Haitian sisters who are both seeking asylum and who have Temporary Protected Status currently because of the troubles in Haiti. Nadeige has a two year old daughter, Saphora, who was born in Arizona very shortly after Nadeige crossed into the United States. She walked to our southern border here while pregnant from Brazil. Nadeige and Sophora have been living in Boston for the last two years, receiving social services. Definitions - NST is Neighborhood Support Team, volunteer organizations created to support asylum seeking immigrants and other refugees. SISC NST is the organization I am involved with. SISC is the Seacoast Interfaith Sanctuary Coalition, a volunteer group formed in 2017 to fight the mass deportation of Indonesians living in Dover. There about a half dozen active faith communities in SISC, convened by Maggie Fogarty with the lead congregation being the Dover Quakers. First Parish Dover, Durham Community Church, South Church Unitarian Universalist, Trinity Lutheran, and Temple Israel are the most engaged congregations, among us supporting several different people in different ways. WelcomeNH is the umbrella organization for creating and supporting NSTs, a partner nonprofit that is sanctioned by the federal government for this work.

Our family's housing in a shelter in Boston became untenable and WelcomeNH brought them to Dover. WelcomeNH is already working with three other Haitian families. Dover was possible because housing could be arranged in the "Tiny House" development off Back River Road and there is the promise of eventual full-time work with the group building the Tiny Houses.

Currently Erlande has a night job, 20 hours/week, with a cleaning company in Portsmouth. She has applied for a full-time job on the cleaning crew at UNH. Once she has a full-time job, Nadeige will be seeking full-time employment in the hours Erlande is not working, allowing them to rotate childcare.

SISC NST is working with the family to connect with jobs, provide transportation, raise money to subsidize the rent, connect them with healthcare and other social services. For those who might want to get involved, there are opportunities for one-off help and more indepth work.

Right now we are providing Erlande with rides to and from Portsmouth - to Portsmouth to start work at 6pm, pick--up at 10pm, Monday - Friday. Email Jeremiah Dickinson for the SignUpGenius link if this is something a person can do - I generally do the pick-up at 10pm. We also provide rides to appointments and for shopping and to food banks. <u>dacha@comcast.net</u>

We can use lots of help in other ways:

- Working on a fundraiser or two as we have no support other than individual donations (hint to Rotary Community Service perhaps?)
- French language translation as needed.
- Serving as scribe for the group's weekly meetings would be a big help.
