Program – Waterfront Commission pdate - Steve Bird and Norm Fracassa.

Steve is project manager for waterfront development. Vital project for city and region. Displayed a map of the entire development. Part of a 20-year project to clean up the waterfront. Formerly the site for city facilities, was once an industrial site, including solid waste disposal. Unique to have such a piece of municipal property right on the waterfront. Objective is to make available to all citizens and as a tool for economic development. The public park will be about 4.3 acres and the centerpiece of the property. Improvements by the city include new roadways, storm water management system with lots of green infrastructure, new sewer and water lines. The project is a partnership with developer Cathartes, for last 5 years. Includes:

- 420 residential housing, mostly rental and some for sale.
- 20,000 sf of commercial: restaurants and retail most prominently
- Tax base of about 75 million dollars.

City improvements through TIF agreement. Means all costs to the city will be paid by increased tax revenue from the site. Environmental improvements: stabilizing shoreline, raising elevation to prepare for sea level rise, providing access with launch and later, tour boats and private boats to bring people to downtown Dover.

Cochecho Advisory Committee (12 volunteers and city staff) was formed in 2004, dedicated volunteers, oversees entire project.

Current Committee Chair Norm: Spoke to Rotary in 2009 and worked with us redeveloping Park Street park. He praised Dana Lynch for his long service, who was recently recognized as Volunteer of the Year. Norm is a landscape architect – as with most Advisory Committee members, an area of expertise – and has been on the Advisory Committee almost since the beginning. Much of what is being done is stuff that would need to be done in any case.

Ironwood is the company (from Newmarket) doing the park. The park is city land, open to all. Objective is to create a vibrant space that is a complement to our downtown. There are lots of design guidelines in place for the developer and their buildings. Wanted the building to "look forward" – not replicating mills – also with references to current Dover buildings, e.g., the corner tower of the building as one enters the area from the Makem Bridge. There is a 60-ft space between the two large buildings in the first phase. Lots of reclaimed granite, open access to the public. Townhouses on back end of the project.

Steve spoke about permitting process. Recent milestones:

- All necessary state & federal permits needed for project
- Planning Board approval for private buildings
- City council has approved funding for infrastructure.
- The council awarded the bid to build the park: Northeast Earth Mechanics ground breaking in about a month.

Question - some residential units will have river views

Question/Statement – Rotary may have an interest in having a signature piece.

Cathy noted that Dover 400 needs about \$80,000 to fund 7 or 8 places for public art. Rotary might sponsor.

Any thought to Workforce Housing the buildings? Early on, lots of discussion about type of housing; developers had at least two meetings with housing authority about how to do that. Possibility of changing some of the Orpheum units in the future. In the end, in this case, the increase in the value of these units will be part of the reason the project will help pay the city bonds, so high value property is a priority.
