and awards including a 2013 New England Patriots Myra Kraft Community MVP award. He has a doctoral degree in chemistry, post-doc in organic chemistry and is member of the Peabody Rotary Club.

Dr. Fine stressed the importance of early self-detection of melanoma and the Foundation's work on educating middle and high school students. There are three kinds of skin cancer: basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma and melanoma – the deadliest form of skin cancer that targets 11-36 year olds, although it can happen at any age. This year there will be 190,000 new cases of melanoma, five times as prevalent as HIV/AIDS. There is one death, every hour in the U.S. from melanoma.

Melanoma doesn't care what your skin color is, how fit you are or if no one in your family has had it. Contributing factors include having a blistering sunburn under 20 years of age, exposure of normally covered skin to strong sun and regular use of tanning beds. 30% develop melanoma from preexisting moles. Important to look for changes in moles - size, color, shape, surface or thickness.

Dr. Fine described differences in types of melanoma, using graphic photos, including striking photos of young men and women who have died from the disease. He urged everyone to check their skin once a

month using mirrors, flashlights and the help of a friend or relative to search through scalp where melanoma can be difficult to find. If you find something, contact a dermatologist.

Don't' get a **Tan to Die For**, he said, use lots of sunscreen, avoid being in the sun between 10 am and 4 pm, wear wide brim hats, and sun protective clothing and sunless tanning lotion is even better.
