PROGRAM – Dan Weeks, Revision Energy Director of Marketing "NH Energy Future"

Bio: Dan got his start in clean energy as a teen member of the award-winning ConVal Solar Race Car Team in Peterborough, NH. Although solar-powered racing wasn't breaking any records in the 1990s, the cars were early proof that solar could be a convincing alternative to fossil fuels. Two decades later, he proudly powers his well-insulated home with a 5.5-kilowatt rooftop solar array and drives a speedy Chevy Bolt, charged by the sun.

Before discussing the future of energy in NH, Dan began his presentation with a look at the past, showing a view of the Amoskeag Mill from the Civil War era where huge water-powered turbines created the world's largest cotton mill in Manchester, NH. It was the era of "local, distributed and renewable" energy. He moved on to a scene from an Easter parade in New York City in 1900 where only one automobile moved along 5th Avenue surrounded by hundreds of horse drawn carriages. By 1913 that same 5th Avenue event depicted one horse drawn carriage surrounded by hundreds of gasoline-powered automobiles, leading emission by emission to the present day.

Dan described the Present as the era of centralized and non-renewable energy that makes up 80% of NH's energy sources including nuclear, petroleum and natural gas. The remaining small percent of renewable energy comes from hydro power, wind and solar (1.5%). And, the cost of energy in NH, as well all know, is the highest in the country.

He noted factors involved in the cost of energy in NH include:

- a rise in surface temperatures by 2090 the temperatures in NH will be similar to those currently in the Carolinas.
- an increase in precipitation more frequent and heavier rain
- increased frequency of extreme weather events
- a rise in sea levels

For all these reasons, Dan said, there are more premature deaths, more chronic bronchitis and more asthma. The moose population in Northern Maine has dwindled due to the rise of ticks from warmer winter weather, maple sugaring has decreased due to warmer winters and the ski industry has suffered for the same reason.

In the Future, Dan sees a return to energy that is local, distributed and clean or cleaner with the increase use of renewable wind and solar. Although he admits the most used non-renewable energy sources will still be around for many decades, he envisions a future with 100% clean energy and an era when rates will go down, jobs will increase (a net of 750 in NH), and large open areas will be dedicated to solar panels and offshore wind fields. Many non-profits and NH schools are already using solar as demonstrated by the solar panels atop the new Dover High School. He predicts they will see a 20-80% reduction in electricity charges.

Dan is hopeful more legislation will be passed to allow the expansion of solar which he believes will reduce demand, lower electric rates and help the entire electrical grid in NH. For more information visit: <u>revisionenergy.com</u>.
