Doug L., Noreen & Frank B.'s neighbor, is an Engineer. He and his wife Lori just celebrated their 45th wedding anniversary. They moved to Dover about three years ago from the Newburyport area where he lived for the past 30 years.

Before moving to Dover, Doug looked at real estate websites like Trulia & Zillow – and saw a YouTube video of the house on Spur Road in Dover, knowing the location was beautiful and yet the house needed a lot of work. They vacationed previously on Bear Island on Lake Winnepesaukee, drove through Dover on the Spaulding Turnpike, but they never thought they would make a change. Doug kept thinking about looking out over the river and decided to purchase the property. The Locys sold their home in Newburyport before all the renovations on their Spur Rd. home were done, so they decided to stay in a hotel just down the road. By that time, they

had met Noreen & Frank and for the next week, the new neighbors moved in with the Biehls while the 7 week of renovations took place. What great neighbors!

They made an offer, and thought it was going to be counter offered and yet it was accepted!!! Doug couldn't imagine at his fine age of 76 he would buy a home and have to fix it up. Being an engineering he liked to fix and build things as his hobby and that is what he was going to do.

Doug grew up in the mid-west and went to school at the University of Illinois. After college, he ended up working for Western Electric. They would say, once you joined Western Electric, you joined it for life. Doug worked there for two years and transferred to SafeGuard in Connecticut – an anti-missile program by Bell Laboratories, where he got top security clearance and then they disbanded the program. He had to find another job, and moved to a company in North Andover.

In the mid 1990's many of the companies were getting out of manufacturing and going off-shore. His company then sold to a company in New York, and the rest of company did not really exist. So Doug sat down with his wife, asking "what are we going to do? They talked about their portfolio and the possibility of retiring and that is what they decided, 20 years ago.

Doug took advantage of moving out of the city to relax and not feel guilty, which only took him about 6 months to figure out.

Between Doug and Lori, they have four kids including a daughter in Illinois, daughter in Pennsylvania, son in California, where Doug and Lori travel to see the grand-kids. Their other daughter passed away about 1½ years ago from complications of alcohol. It has been tough on them yet being up here in their new home with new friends has helped.

Back when Doug was in Newburyport, he was very involved with the Planning Board and the Waterfront and Preservation Divisions. He helped develop what is now the Newburyport waterfront district. Tracey D., a graduate of Newburyport High School, noted how proud she is of how Newburyport looks today.

Now that Doug was retired and in Dover, he was looking for a way to get involved in the local community. Noreen suggested the Dover Rotary and Frank suggested the Durham Rotary. Once Doug had to get up early to attend the 7:30am breakfast meeting in Durham, he knew that the Rotary Club of Dover was where he wanted to be. It made his choice easy and he is pleased and honored to be with our Club and thanks Noreen B. for sponsoring him.
