Program - Mini-Classification Talks

Planned speaker did not show (confused the date of the Dover meeting) – so mini classification talks. Picked at random:

Matt S. – in club since '06, past president '13-'14. Came to Dover about 1998 to go to UNH and never left the area. Banking career started in '05. Now works for Eastern Bank as a senior lender. Less time for Rotary now because of having children. Matt was in Interact in high school, one of the first in NH.

Malcolm M. – grew up in Peabody, brother is a doctor, sister has her own business. Wanted to be a baseball player, but couldn't hit a curve ball. Tufts College, BU for law school. Daughter lives in Philly, two grandchildren, son lives in Milwaukee, going to see him tomorrow in Chicago to see *Hamilton*. His law job was putting businesses in place where people didn't want to have them. First project was with Kerry Forbes, project was greatly opposed but got built because complied with the law. Has been before NH Supreme Court 43 times, with success in all but 2 cases. Rotary meaningful in life because gives opportunity to do things might not do otherwise. Has been on the WDH Board which does good things in the community. In retirement for 4 years.

Nancy B. – Been in Dover since 1932, 4 months less than Bob Richard. Genealogy search reveals characteristics – 3% Neanderthal is very rare and not generally this high. An ancestor was hung in Salem as a witch. Career as a nurse in community health – 33 years. Has visited 38 countries, all states but lowa and Hawaii. Gregg D. – Born/raised in southeastern Mass, college at U of Farmington, married 46 years. Started as classroom teacher in a two-room school house. Became principal, central administrator for five elementary schools. Friend introduced him to The Goodwill Idea, became child care executive, worked with over 1,000 kids. In 2006 went to children's home in Easton, PA, worked with lots of kids from Philly. Great kids, lots of issues and lots of challenges. Retired at 65, 3 years ago, moved to Dover and wanted to get to know Dover people. Had been in Rotary in PA. Last year, built new home in So. Berwick, staying here in Dover Rotary. Daughter in Biddeford, ME with twin grandchildren.

Terrie H. – Born/raised in Dover – family for generations. Isaac Lucas was an ancestor, brickyard on Cochecho, now Brickyard Estates. Out of high school went to work for UPS, built first house at age 21, married and child at 22. Interested in real estate (grew up in mobile home), 1978 NH Housing Authority came out with low income loans – got in line at 4:30 in the morning to get low interest loan. When moved to Brickyard Estates, got real estate license to buy her own house. 33 years still in the business and loves it. Two daughters, one in Charleston, SC, other daughter is CT scan tech at WDH. Six grandchildren total. Took care of grandchild when daughter moved to Charleston.

Jerry D. – Superintendent of Dover schools for 16 years, principal at Oyster River and before that principal in CT. In retirement now, didn't find it difficult. Retired because night meetings got to be a real drag. Transition by teaching part-time at UNH, did that for about two years. Then taught a course at Antioch New England; once class was Business – students did business plans. One was for a toy store - an adult toy store – presumably upscale in Portland.
