# **Program:** Ann Lee Hussey

Ann Lee is a fellow Rotarian and an ardent spokesperson for Polio Plus. She has traveled extensively throughout the world on behalf of Rotary International's efforts to eradicate Polio. She has only recently returned from her latest travels including a trip to Sicily.

In April 1955, the Salk Vaccine was approved as a means to combat a terrible disease that affected thousands of people every year. Through the efforts of the March of Dimes and five leading organizations; Rotary International, The World Health Organization, The Center for Disease Control, UNICEF, and The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, Polio has almost been eradicated worldwide. This past year saw only 94 new cases with 18 in Afghanistan and 76 in Pakistan.

This has happened through the efforts of tens of thousands of healthcare workers worldwide who have face danger, extreme weather, war and hardships to deliver this life saving vaccine to thousands around the globe. Ann Lee herself has journeyed to over ten countries on thirty different trips to deliver the vaccine.

Ann Lee told of her personal journey with polio beginning as a young child of nine in South Berwick, Maine. She told of her mother who faithfully massaged her legs every three hours for years as she worked to regain the use of her limbs. She also told of others who contracted the disease at the same time yet were less fortunate than she and continue to this day to be unable to stand or move.

Ann spoke of a caring person, Mrs. Woodbury, who after reading of Ann Lee's challenges with polio in the Portland newspaper, sent cards and letters to Ann for 35 years, always tucking a few dollars for her in the envelope. Ann stated that we should never underestimate our ability to make a difference in someone's life.

Ann has made a difference in the lives of many as she has worked tirelessly advocating for the Rotary Foundation's Polio Plus campaign and serving as a healthcare worker in far-away communities. She is determined to see polio eradicated form our world. Already we have seen Type 2 and Type 3 strains of polio wiped out. We now focus on the final strain and we are making progress.

Ann Lee feels blessed that her life has come full circle and knows that we must continue our efforts to support the fight against polio.
